WINSTON ORCHARDS HIT

From 20 to 50 per cent of the prune blossoms in the Winston district have been killed by frost, according to the estimate of W. C. Harding and John M. Throne, who made an inspection of that area today. This, however, does not signify a corresponding proportion of crop loss. Blossoms on prune trees always far outnumber the quantity of fruit that matures, and the thinning made by the cold spell to date will not do material damage. Such fruit as was found in the embryonic stage appeared sound, and Mr. Harding predicts a good sized crop if the excessively cold weather ceases.

BEND, Ore., April 21.—The First National Bank of Bend remained closed today, in charge of W. C. Crawley, national bank examiner. An audit is under way, and when it is completed a statement will be issued. Closing of the bank yesterday was followed by announcement that it was due to depletion of reserves.

PROSECUTION IN DOBBS CASE IN FINAL PHASE
(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SEATTLE, April 21.—The final links of the chain of circumstantial evidence against Dr. C. C. Dobbs, Kirkland dentist, accused of the murder of Letitia Whitehall, school girl patient, were being forged by the state in superior court here today.

Professor William M. Dehn, University of Washington biologist and chemist, was expected to be the last state witness. Prosecutor Ewing D. Colvin hoped to rest the state's case by noon, unless by some chance Frank Koepfler, former coroner's deputy, and missing state witness, should appear by that time.

Koepfler's testimony is regarded by Colvin as being of negligible importance, and would probably be brief and perfunctory. Koepfler was the person who delivered the specimens and exhibits to Dehn for analysis.

George H. Crandell, chief of defense counsel, said it would require at least three days to present Dobbs' side of the case. He plans to launch at once into an attack of the state's evidence, to

prove that Letitia Whitehall was seen after she left the dentist's office and to establish an alibi for Dr. Dobbs.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, April 21.—The Dow ticker service today carries from its Tokyo correspondent a report that Japanese Finance Minister Takahashi has ordered all banks closed at midnight for two days.

LOAD LIMIT INCREASED

LA GRANDE, Ore., April 21.—The load limit on the Old Oregon Trail Highway between La Grande and Pendleton was today increased from 6,500 pounds to 10,000 pounds, according to Oscar Cutler, of the local highway offices. In about two weeks, it is expected that all load restrictions will be removed.

DAMAGE VERDICT OF \$5370 AGAINST COPCO

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) MEMPHIS, Ore., April 21.—A jury in the circuit court this morning returned a verdict for \$5370 for Fred G. Sanders against the California-Oregon Power company after an hour's deliberation. Sanders based his suit upon the death of his son, Atha, a former high school football star, who was electrocuted in 1925 when the telephone line he was repairing came in contact with a power line. The power company alleged contributory negligence and trespass, and the plaintiff charged negligence and improper safeguards as its grounds.

"SHOOT TO KILL" IS ORDER IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., April 21.—Portland police, who have been trying to check a crime wave were given orders today by Chief L. V. Jenkins, to "shoot to kill" in the war on bandits.

"The criminals now at work in the city have proven their daring, so be prepared for emergencies," wrote Chief Jenkins in his order. "If and when occasion arises, remember these are truly bad men. Do not quibble in an extreme emergency, but shoot to kill."

"There is only one way of dealing with these high powered crooks," said Chief Jenkins, in commenting on the order, "and that is to use their own tactics against them. Gunmen must expect to be faced by guns. Armed criminals are all potential murderers."
