OREGON TRUNK DECISION EXPECTED NEXT MONDAY

PORTLAND, Ore., April 22.—Decision by the Oregon Trunk as to acceptance of a common user contract offered by the Southern Pacific company on its tracks between Paulina and Klamath Falls for the northern road's Bend to Klamath Falls extension is expected to be announced Monday, the

day that time for consideration expires. The northern lines obtained an extension to that date with permission of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Officials of the Spokane, Portland and Seattle railway, subsidiary of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific, which jointly have planned the extension, would not confirm a report published here, that the Bend-Klamath Falls project will be carried on by the Great Northern alone without cooperation from the Northern Pacific.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) ATLANTA, Ga., April 22.—Dr. Stanley Coutler, dean emeritus of Purdue University, has a warm spot in his heart for the "young lady of today with her cute bobbed hair and her short skirt" and thinks that a lot of things the younger generation does is no worse than his participating in a dance at a prayer meeting many years ago. MISSOURI FRUIT CROPS HEAVILY HIT BY FROST

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) JOPLIN, Mo., April 22.—A killing frost swept over the Ozark fruit belt last night, causing damage exceeding \$2,000,000, Charles Carmichael, secretary of the Ozark Fruit Growers' association, estimated today. He said fifty per cent or more of the grape crop and 25 to 50 per cent of the strawberry crop was wiped out.

CANTONESE BATTERY DESTROYS FOE'S TRAIN

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SHANGHAI, China, April 22.—A Kuowen (Chinese news agency) dispatch from Nanking reports that artillery fire from the Cantonese batteries at Lion Hui, Nanking, destroyed a Shantungese armored train at Pukow across the river.

INES CHARGED WITH EXCEEDING FARM RATES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SALEM, Ore., April 22.—Charging that the Southern Pacific and the Oregon-Washington Railway and Navigation company are fixing freight rates on certain farm products in excess of the rate allowed by the state service commission today began action to require the railway companies to reduce their rates. At the same time a letter was written to Attorney General I. H. Yanwinkle asking him to proceed in behalf of the state and exact penalties provided under section 5883, Oregon laws.

The commission on August 29, 1925, issued an order fixing rates on hay, grain products, potatoes and onions transported within the state. The order was contested in the courts, finally going to the state supreme court, where it was upheld a few weeks ago. The order called for substantial reductions in transportation of all the commodities listed.

The commission charges, however, that in many instances the O. W. R. & N. and the S. P. company are refusing to apply the new rates. This morning an order and citation were issued to the two companies, requiring them to appear before the commission at Portland on May 4, and show cause why the commission's order has been violated.

The law under which penalties would be fixed provides that "for every such violation, failure or refusal, such railroad shall forfeit and pay into the state treasury, a sum not less than \$100 nor more than \$1,000 for each offense."

NOVOCAINE IN BODY OF GIRL DISPUTES DOBBS' ASSERTION

SEATTLE, April 22.—The state's case against Dr. C. C. Dobbs, a Kirkland dentist, accused of the murder of Letitia Whitehall, a school girl patient, moved rapidly towards its close today, as George H. Crandell, defense counsel, completed the cross-examination of Professor William M. Dehn of the University of Washington chemist.

Prosecutor Ewing D. Colvin brought his direct examination of Professor Dehn to a carefully planned dramatic climax yesterday.

The chemist had detailed to the jury the steps through which his analysis of the exhibits in the case passed before he was convinced novocaine had been administered to the girl before her death.

He also declared novocaine had

been found in a syringe seized in Dr. Dobbs' office.

Dr. Dobbs had been contending that he had not used novocaine for 15 years. Crandell's questioning of Professor Dehn today was planned to show that it would have taken at least 18 injections of the drug to have caused the effects claimed by the state, and that the syringe would have had to have been refilled many times.

Crandell also planned to emphasize that the state had not produced any evidence of punctures on the body of the girl where the drug was supposed to have been administered.

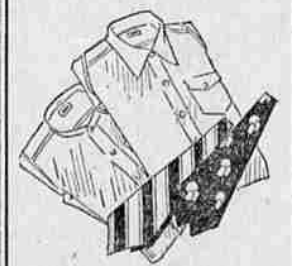
