DODGE, JR., HAS FIGHT WITH REPORTERS AND CAMERA MEN ON SHIP

SAN FRANCISCO, April 22.—Honore E. Dodge, Jr., multimillionaire heir to the Dodge Motor millions, was arrested here today on three charges of assault, preferred against him by newspaper reporters and camera men after he had asked a wild niece on the steamship President Madison today.

Dodge became enraged at the efforts of the interviewers to learn whether he had become reconciled with his wife who earlier in the day denied such a report.

In the course of the fracas aboard the steamer, Dodge, by a ruse, locked several reporters in his stateroom and refused to release them. He was accused of using profane language against the newspaper men and of having smashed cameras and battered photographers who sought to take pictures of him garbed in the ship's engineer's overalls.

NEARLY 3 MILES A MINUTE MADE BY CALIFORNIAN

Whiling its tiny song of victory over the flawless surface of Rogers Dry Lake, near Lancaster, California, Frank Lockhart's diminutive 91 cubic inch Miller Special established a new world speed record for cars of its class, by clipping off a measured mile in 21.5 seconds, or at the rate of 17.3 miles per hour, according to official time records released by G. F. Stephenson, of the A. A. A. National Contest Board.

This nearly three mile a minute pace is the fastest time made by any car of anywhere near its cubic inch displacement, and has been exceeded only by Major Seagrave's Daytona Monster thirty times larger than Lockhart's mount and Malcolm Campbell's record made with a much heavier car on Pendine Beach, Wales, England.

A few minutes after the arrival of the Dodge Brothers Special sedan carrying Fred Wagner, veteran starter, and Captain A. A. Leavelle, official timer for the trial, Lockhart was seeing the blue-like surface of the Dry Lake in practice trials.

The official time made by Lockhart for the mile was 21.5 seconds, or 17.3 miles per hour. The return time over the course, as required by international records, was 22.85 seconds, accomplished in the face of a heavy cross wind.

HORROR INCREASES AS COLD AND EPL. DEMIC STRIKES

ing southward. There is no outlet for this flood until the water has covered an area more than a hundred miles long and many miles wide. It will probably find the Mississippi again from the St. Francis into which it will flow near Helena.

Across the Mississippi where the Arkansas tributaries are piling great heaps of water onto the levees in the Mississippi delta, there are probably 200,000 people viewing with alarm the ever increasing danger.

A relief train bearing 13 boats and 18 men to operate them was speeding southward from St. Louis toward Arkansas. The boats were to be launched, it was planned, when the train should be stopped by the high waters.

Unconfirmed reports from Knowlton, Arkansas, and that 15 refugees drowned there when a boat was drawn through the crooked area rent in the levee at that point.

Pettyville Washed Away
Pettyville, Arkansas, was literally wiped from the map when the flood tore buildings from their foundations and swept them away. At Little Rock, hundreds of families were in danger and relief work was being pressed forward.

Memphis had converted a large fair grounds into a refugee camp. Governors of Mississippi valley states and mayors of towns affected have issued urgent appeals for aid in caring for the victims.

Cold Wave Adds to Woes.
CHICAGO, April 22.—Snow and cold have brought misery and property damage to a midwest already suffering from the destruction done by storms and floods.

Flood victims in Illinois and Missouri, many of whom have been living in makeshift shelters since they were driven from their homes by the rising waters, received the sub-seasonal temperatures as added misfortune.

In the fruit belts and truck garden areas considerable damage was reported, especially in Iowa. That state was covered with snow from half an inch to five inches deep. The cherry and peach crops in that section adjacent to Panama, Ill., were severely damaged by the cold.

The thermometer fell into the top twenties in Chicago last night, bringing discomfort to a citizenry, part of which only a few days ago was sporting on the beaches under a summer sun. Rising temperatures were forecast for today and tomorrow.

Coolidge Asks Aid
WASHINGTON, April 22.—President Coolidge today issued a proclamation asking for aid for the sufferers in the area flooded by the Mississippi river and its tributaries.

The flood situation "is indeed grave," the President's proclamation said, and for the task of caring for the thousands of refugees "additional funds must be obtained immediately." Mr. Coolidge recounted the efforts of the war department and other government branches to relieve suffering but added that the "burden of caring for the human beings upon the agency designated by government charter to provide relief in disaster—the American Red Cross."

"I am confident," he said, "that as always in the past, the people will support the Red Cross in its humane task."

Two Towns Abandoned
ST. LOUIS, April 22.—The towns of Lilbourn and New Madrid, in southeast Missouri, were virtually abandoned today as the residents fled before the raging water of the Mississippi.

Several hundred inhabitants left the stricken area aboard a special train late yesterday. Others previously had been taken to places of safety.

Refugees have been straggling into Cape Girardeau, Mo., from the lowlands, about 300 arriving yesterday. Levees there were more than two feet above the water level and holding in good condition.

The Mississippi at Cairo, Illinois and Cape Girardeau, receded slowly today but there was no let up in vigilance at the dikes.

Weather Improving
ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 22.—Fair weather, absent so long in the Mississippi valley, replaced rain and cold of recent days.

Conditions became worse in Arkansas and the Mississippi delta as the flood waters moved out of the upper valley.

Three breaks, within the past 26 hours, at levees on the Mississippi and Arkansas rivers added several hundred square miles to the inundated territory and drove additional thousands from their homes into refugee camps. Water was washing over the levee at Albern, Miss., and at Memphis, Tenn.

The death toll mounted to 47 with confirmation of the loss of the government launch Pelican, with 9 persons aboard.

Six thousand refugees and the 12,000 inhabitants of Greenville, Miss., faced short food supplies as the municipal levee broke, inundating most of the city.

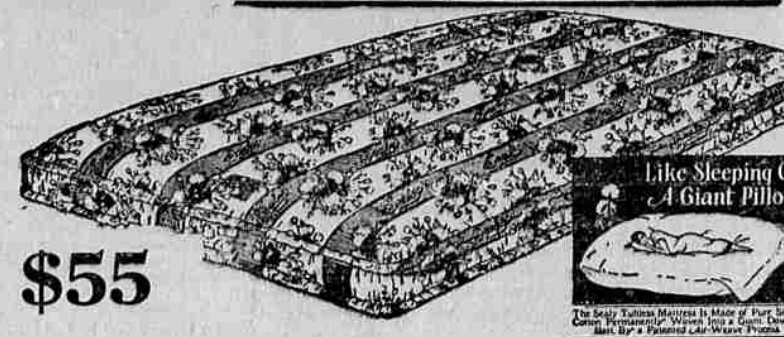

Conditions Better
Conditions in western Kentucky, southeastern Missouri and southern Illinois improved. Beardtown, Illinois, profiting by a similar experience last year, was going about business as nearly usual as possible with the town under water. Schools, however, were closed.

Highman, Kentucky, fighters saved the Redfoot levee after several days of continuous placing of sandbags on top and stopping "sand boils." New Madrid, Missouri, where water was three or four feet deeper than in the Mississippi channel, reported the flood was slowly receding.

DANCE MARATHON AT VENICE; \$1000 PRIZE AND TITLE

LOS ANGELES, April 22.—Approximately 20 couples danced to the jazz rhythm of one step and fox trots and the dreamy strains of the waltz on a ball room floor here today in competition for the "world's endurance dancing championship," which started yesterday at Venice, 35 miles away.

Those still in the whirl were all that remained of a starting field of 250 couples, who glided off the Venice pier at six o'clock yesterday afternoon on a 15-mile "shuttle" over pavement to the public dance hall here. The marathoners warmed up their three hours of dancing on the beach pier, offering a varied exhibition of Charleston, waltzes, fox trots, and the black bottom.

Hemmed in on all sides by spectators, the dancers moved away from the pier within a roped off enclosure, dancing to the music furnished by jazz orchestras preceding them in motor trucks. The torchbearers were of all ages, their costumes of the greatest array, but principally comfortable old clothes.

A city ordinance prohibiting dancing after 1 a. m. was lifted to permit the staging of the marathon, which was to continue until the last couple to remain dancing in the ball room won. They will receive a \$1,000 prize and the "world's endurance dancing championship," as the marathon is billed.

LOS ANGELES, April 22.—Ten couples remained as uneliminated contestants in an endurance dance marathon when city health authorities stopped it at noon today, approximately 21 hours after it was started. The thousand dollar prize for the winning pair was divided equally among the twenty nearly exhausted dancers.

JOSEPHINE TIN ORE OPTIONED TO SEATTLE CONCERN

(Associated Press, Leased Wire.)
GRANTS PASS, April 22.—Options on 184 acres of tin ore ground five miles north of Grants Pass were signed here last night by J. M. Thrasher, representing Seattle mining interests. The purchase price is given at \$25,000, with a substantial payment already made.

This is the second tin option taken here in as many weeks. Guggenheim interests, the American Smelting and Refining company, signed 29 tin claims on the upper Evans Creek a few miles east of this city, with option to buy for \$100,000.

There are many other rumors of options and sales but buyers are operating quietly and are withholding deals.

Four miles north of Grants Pass every ledge which shows the formations in which the white metal is found have been staked out. One single agency here has sold over 1100 location blanks in the past ten days. Business men as well as miners are staking out groups of claims in various parts of the county. Grants Pass evidently being the center of the white metal deposits.

One group is reported to have optioned 6,000 acres in the Illinois valley. Foot Creek, near the Josephine county line in Jackson county, is virtually all staked out and Williams Creek is the scene of the latest rush for claims with rich ore being brought in from there. Yesterday 23 samples of ore from new finds were brought to the city. Evans Creek valley north east of Grants Pass, is about taken up with claims. Thousands of acres of government land have been taken, with that close to the city and within reach of easy transportation receiving first attention.
