MAKING PLANS FOR ANNUAL MILITARY TRAINING CAMP

VANCOUVER BARRACKS, Washington, April 22.—Active preparations for the Citizens' Military Training Camp for infantry to be held at Vancouver Barracks from June 17 to July 16, are under way at the present time and a complete tent camp, equipped with showers, bath houses, mess halls and mess halls will be in place ready for the 375 boys who are expected to take advantage of the opportunity for military and citizenship training during the vacation months.

The campaign is open to boys between the ages of 17 and 24 inclusive, for the basic course, expense of going to camp and returning home will be paid by the government, and each boy will be furnished with uniform, food and shelter, free of charge, while at camp.

Places have been reserved for six boys from Douglas county. No obligation for future service in any component of the United States army attaches to attendance at Citizens' Military Training Camps.
