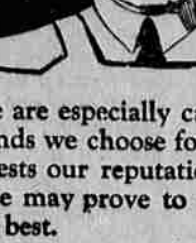

LANE COUNTY CHERRY CROP HIT BY FROSTS

EUGENE, Ore., April 21.—The cherry crop of southern Lane county was damaged to the extent of approximately 65 per cent, according to C. W. Steward, county fruit inspector, who made a survey of the southern Lane territory yesterday and this morning. The pear crop was scarcely hurt, he said, while the prune crop in sections was damaged about 10 to 25 per cent.

The main cherry damage was in the bottom land districts, he said. The alighted sections were not so hard hit.

NEW YORK—Facts and rumors about the motor industry have Wall Street all stirred up. One fact is that if one had put \$10,000 in General Motors in 1908 and bought 100 of the original shares, he would have received cash and stock by now that would figure at current market values at \$1,218,393. One rumor is that there shortly will be a new Ford four-cylinder model to sell around \$450, a six cylinder to sell around \$775 and an Edsel 8, at about \$1,150.

NEW YORK—Coffee to officials of the Red Star line news of a romance aboard the Beigenland on a cruise around the world. TRANS-ATLANTIC FLIER TAKING NO CHANCES

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

PARIS, April 22.—Captain Charles Nungesser has no intention of spoiling his chances of flying across the Atlantic from Paris to New York by doing anything precipitate. He is carrying out every possible test on his plane with deliberation and care. Today he was closely watching bench tests of the engine which will be substituted for the one used in the trial flights. The engine is being run under exactly the same conditions of varying speed as on the trans-Atlantic flight, and will turn continuously until it has consumed four tons of gasoline, the amount which the plane will carry. Then it will be taken apart and every piece scrutinized for signs of undue wear and friction. If everything is satisfactory, the motor will be re-assembled and mounted on the plane.
