IN THE REALM OF SPORTS

There is an impression that the next battle for the world's heavyweight championship again will find Jack Dempsey trying to place the spell of Gene Tunney's fistie philosophy.

Insiders profess to see, in Tex Rickard's preliminary maneuvers, a plan to bring Jack and Gene together again on the theory that they will draw the biggest gate of any possible attraction.

Rickard has made no secret of his desire to have such a match but he has been equally as insistent that Dempsey first must show whether he is entitled to a return bout by meeting one or more of the survivors of the heavyweight elimination tournament.

Dove-tailing with Rickard's purposes, in all probability, is Dempsey's latest statement from his training camp retreat, to the effect that he expects to be ready to fight around July.

The probability is that if Dempsey definitely decides to come back he will have only one obstacle to hurdle in order to gain a return title fight.

This obstacle may be Jim Maloney, Jack Sharkey or Paulino Uzcudun, the Spaniard. With Jack Delaney apparently out of the heavyweight picture, by edict of the New York boxing board, the prospect now is that the winner of the Sharkey-Maloney scrap May 19, will meet Paulino to decide an opponent for Dempsey around July fourth.

Ray Kramer has reached the pitching peak at a time when most hurlers are on the down grade. Just turned 31, he led the national league's twirlers last year and has gotten off to a flying start this season with three sensational victories in a row for the Swash-buckling Pirates crew. He seemed doomed to end his pitching days in the minors, spending seven of his

playing years with Oakland in the Pacific coast league until the Pirates corralled him in 1924.

Starting his fourth season with Pittsburgh, his record shows 53 major league triumphs and only 23 defeats, for a percentage of about 700.

Eddie Roush isn't alarmed at all over his failure to get his batting slugs adjusted so far in his new outfield role with the New York Giants.

"I recall one season with Cincinnati," he says, "when I failed to connect safely in the first ten games. But I caught my stride later and led the league in batting."

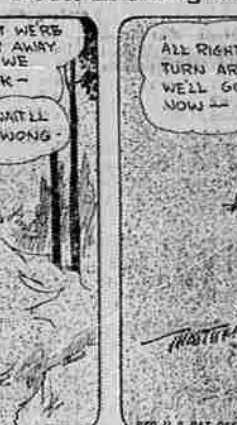
