PORTLAND, Ore., April 25.—Wholesale trade along produce row opened a little slowly this morning. Hogs and veal were in slower demand and with supplies a little stronger than usual, both underwent slight price slumps. Most early sales were half cent under Saturday's top, choice offerings of choice fresh country dressed hogs sold generally at 15¢ cents with a very few at 16¢ cents. Veal was off 1¢ to 1 1/2¢ for choice offerings. Butter and egg prices are unchanged, with week end butter supplies generally cleaned up. The egg trade continues active with a good speculative demand and receipts continue strong with nearly 700 cases stored Saturday.

Reports from primary and local potato markets show a slow demand for the tubers with prices holding barely steady.

CRIME WAVE IN PORTLAND SHOWS NO ABATEMENT

PORTLAND, Ore., April 25.—While no major crimes marked the week-end, just past, police were kept busy on an unusually large number of holdups and small burglaries.

One burglar suspect was taken early today as he attempted flight down a north end rooming house stairway. Two sets of holdup men were encountered by citizens on the streets. In each case the victims showed fight, successfully beating off their assailants in one case and getting beaten up, and then robbed. In the second instance, two men held up Sam P. Morris, taking \$9.55 after beating him severely. Morris fought the robbers hard, trying to take their gun away, and he was hit on the right cheek, right breast and bitten on the right hand. After the shot but fierce fight, the robbers got away in a light touring car.

An evident attempt by two negroes to hold up Tom Carlson and Charles Nelson of the Barr hotel, while they were walking on Fourteenth street near Olean, was fought off by the two white men, who furnished a fair description of their assailants to police.
