STATE TAX COMMISSION LOSES \$13,456 ACTION

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SALEM, Ore., April 26.—The firm of Dant and Russell, Inc., will not be required to pay \$13,456.22 income tax levied against it by the state tax commission in 1923, as a result of a decision handed down by the state supreme court here this morning. The case came before the supreme court on appeal from Multnomah county. Judge John H. Stevenson being affirmed.

The firm brought suit to enjoin the state from collecting the tax, basing its suit on various technicalities of its income report. The whole case was decided on the pleadings, judgment in favor of the company being allowed in circuit court, and an appeal taken. "It would be decidedly preferable to dispose of this case on the merits and not upon the pleadings," the supreme court opinion reads, "but under the record we are constrained to hold that the motion for judgment on the pleadings was properly allowed."

HUSBAND ACCUSED OF KILLING MAN TO WHOM HE HAD GIVEN WIFE

TRENTON, N. J., April 26.—Charles Price was charged today with permitting his wife to go buggy riding with another man and then murdering the man during the ride.

The slain man was Edward Masterson, 38, the same age as Mrs. Price. The husband who gave the strange permission was 63.

The compact was made less than a month ago in the office of Justice of Peace Elmer Smith at Lambertville, where Price was arraigned for murder today. Price had objected to Mrs. Price's association with Masterson. She had left him, staying away for a week. They drew up a covenant by which it was stipulated that Mrs. Price could use her husband's horse and buggy to go riding with Masterson provided she stayed at home during the day and prepared her husband's meals.

BENTON COUNTY RECEIVES SHARE OF TAX REFUND

CORVALLIS, Ore., April 26.—Benton county today received a government warrant for \$298,647.19, the county's share of the Oregon-California tax refund. Officials announced that the county would use its share to retire outstanding bonds, cutting the bonded debt practically in two.
