PORTLAND DRIVER OF DEATH CAR IS FACING PEN TERM

PORTLAND, Ore., April 27.—

Frederick L. Miller, Portland jeweler, will have to serve 15 months in the state penitentiary on a conviction of involuntary manslaughter, unless Governor L. L. Patterson grants him a pardon.

District Attorney Myers today received notice from the state supreme court that Miller had been denied a hearing in circuit court here on a motion for a new trial. This was the last step taken by Miller's attorneys to keep him from going to the penitentiary.

Miller was convicted in connection with the death of Mrs. Alma Hall, aged Fairview resident. Mrs. Hall died from injuries suffered when struck by Miller's automobile on Sandy road near Fairview January 23, 1924. Miller carried his case to the United States supreme court and lost.

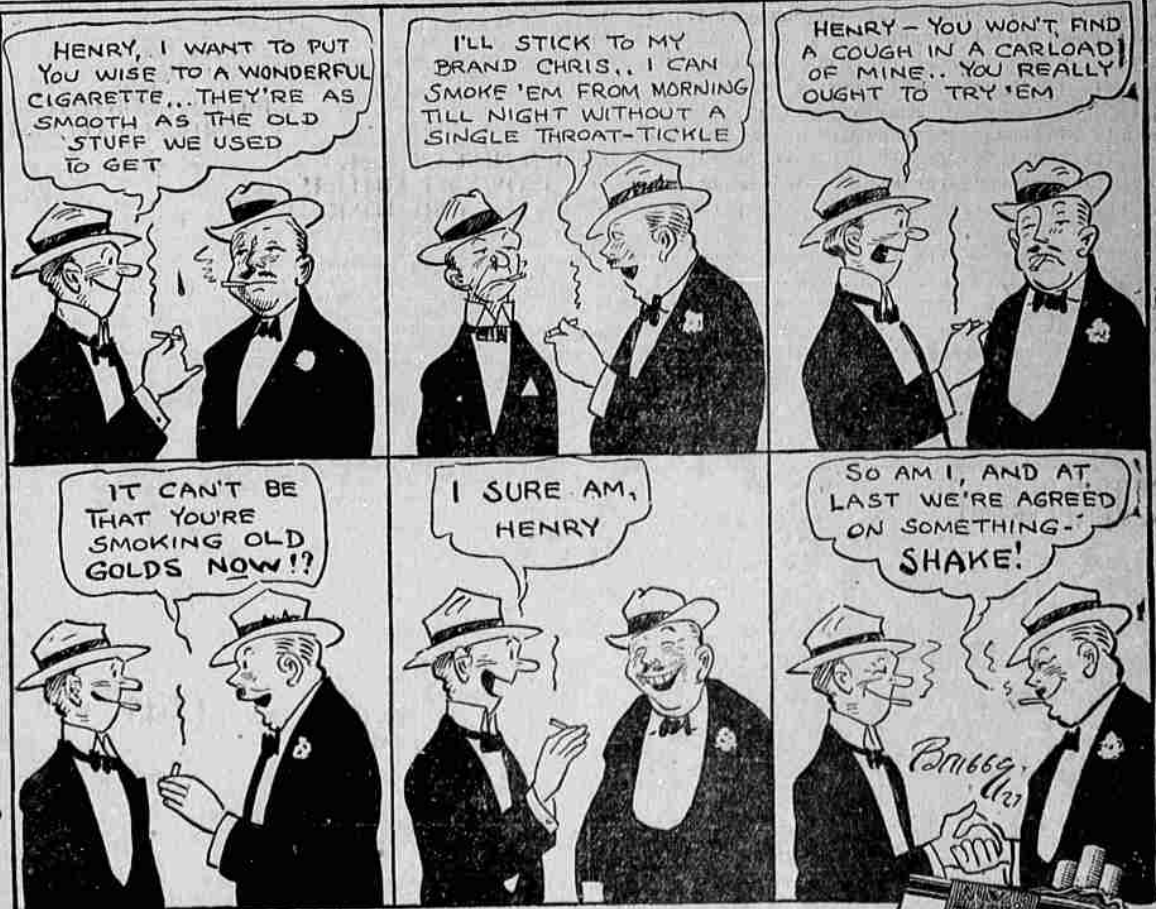
