REFERENDUM ON NEW STATE TAX ACT IS ORDERED

(Continued from page 1.)

knew of its being done before and did not expect it in our case," Smith commented.

The first move was made by Smith several weeks ago with a demand upon Secretary of State Kozier that the bill in question be submitted to the people by referendum. At the time he made his demand Smith indicated his contention that the emergency clause which the bill carried was unconstitutional, the bill being for the purpose of raising revenue.

This has been the gist of the entire legal battle which terminated in the supreme court chamber this morning. The supreme court interpreted the bill in a manner similar to that indicated by Smith. The state had held that the bill was not passed for the direct purpose of raising revenue, that consequently it could legally carry the

emergency clause, and that by reason of the clause it had already gone into effect, precluding the possibility of a popular referendum.

At the time Smith made his demand upon Kozier, Kozier replied that as secretary of state it was outside his authority to pass upon the constitutionality of laws enacted by the legislature, and suggested that for a final determination of this question Smith apply to the courts.

This morning's decision which reverses the lower court, will not send the case back to circuit court to be argued and tried there, but a pre-emptory writ will issue directly from the higher court. The necessary petitions have been circulated and filed with the secretary of state as required to invoke the referendum.

LAMB PRICES IN EASTERN OREGON SAME AS IN 1926

PENDLETON, Ore., April 28.—Seventy-five per cent of the lambs of central and eastern Oregon have been contracted for at prices about the same as those of a year ago, says T. F. Boylen, of Pendleton, who has handled most of this business. Prices for the various type lambs range from 10 to 11 cents a pound. Mutton lambs will start moving east in July and the remainder in September. Within the past ten days 15,000 yearling ewes and wethers have been shipped to Montana at prices of from \$5 to \$12. Twenty thousand ewes with lambs have been sold to Colorado interests for shipment June 1.
