EUGENE, Ore., April 28.—Coach Billy Reinhart and 14 of his University of Oregon baseball players left here this morning for Seattle, where they will engage the University of Washington nine in combat Friday and Saturday.

Since the two defeats at the hands of the Oregon Aggies, Coach Reinhart has made several shifts in his lineup, in an effort to bolster the team. The batting order also has been changed.

The Oregon team is decidedly shy on pitchers, and is depending on Bill Baker to pull them through the first game, and possibly to hurl a part of the second.

The University track relay teams under the tutelage of Coach Bill Hayward will leave here tonight for Seattle, where they will compete in the Washington relays. The varsity teams will be entered in the mile and four mile relays, and two men will be entered in the special 100 yard dash. Wetzel will enter the shot put event. Freshman teams will enter the mile and two mile of class C events.

The strongest combination seems to be the four mile relay from the time turned in at the try-out.

For the second time in three days, George Connally did a rescue act for the White Sox. SALVATION ARMY TO AID IN FLOOD RELIEF EFFORTS

Staffing that Salvation Army workers who were among the first on the ground with the relief for the flood sufferers of the Mississippi valley, report that 80,000 people the homeless and actually destitute. National Commander Evangeline Booth has appealed to heads of the various territories of the organization to raise emergency funds to meet the serious situation.

Local officers have been instructed by Major A. E. Baynton, head officer of the Oregon division, to collect money and clothing to meet this appeal of the national commander. Collections will be made throughout the state where the Salvation Army maintains corps.

"The Salvation Army has never failed sufferers in any catastrophe or calamity, and we must not fail now," states the Oregon officer. "Every garment and every dollar added to this relief fund will be an investment in human life, as conditions are much more serious than most of us who are away from the danger zone realize. The majority of these people who have lost everything they had in the world and barely escaped with their lives, were land renters and poor families with nothing to fall back upon, so they must be assisted in order that they may eventually
