STIMSON SUBMITS U. S. PEACE PLANS FOR NICARAGUA

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, April 27.—Henry L. Stimson, who came to Nicaragua as personal representative of President Coolidge, has invited Dr. Juan B. Sacasa, president of the Liberal government at Puerto Cabezas, to meet him as soon as possible in Managua to discuss the situation. He told the president that a destroyer would be placed at his disposal and that safe conduct would be provided for him and his entourage.

Dr. Sacasa has not yet replied to this invitation, but in a message to Liberal leaders here he accepted a previous proposal to send delegates, saying he would delegate members of his cabinet.

Although Mr. Stimson consistently refuses to make public the opinions he has gathered thus far, it is declared on excellent authority that the ground work for the coming peace talk was laid after liberal chiefs had exchanged messages with Dr. Sacasa notifying him of a peace plan, the gist of which is:

First, Adolfo Diaz, the Conservative president, to remain president until December 31, 1928.

Second, general disarmament by both Liberals and Conservatives.

Third, establishment of a Nicaraguan constabulary of 2500 men, commanded by American officers, to preserve order.

Fourth, American forces remain in Nicaragua in limited numbers indefinitely.

Fifth, Liberals guaranteed participation in the present conservative government and the courts.

Sixth, free elections in 1928, to be guaranteed by the United States if both sides request it.

Seventh, confiscated property to be restored to its rightful owners and damage claims to be adjusted.

Eighth, American marines engaged in an observation flight were fired on yesterday above El Viejo, in the Chinandega region, with rifles and machine guns. There were no casualties.

GUNS OF 45 ALIEN CRAFT TRAINED ON AGITATED HANKOW

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SHANGHAI, April 27.—Forty-five gunboats were stationed in the Yangtze today with their guns trained on Hankow.

While on the surface Hankow is quiet, there is much tension and rumors persist that the British are

planning to retake the concession.

A great deal of looting is reported. It is stated that at Hankow, as well as at Nanjing, field pieces are being moved to selected positions outside the native city.

Vast crowds in Hankow are listening to street corner speeches by radical leaders. Although the authorities reiterate there is no desire to attack foreigners, there is fear, nevertheless, that the coolies, saturated with radical doctrine about "imperialism," will fall to contain themselves in critical moments.

False reports spread like epidemics. When a foreigner has a controversy with the coolies who draws his Jintikka, the rumor of ten spreads that "a foreigner has killed one of our comrades," and mobs form.

All the British women have left Hankow and all the British men whose presence is not essential have been ordered to leave. Many of the better class Chinese are evacuating.

FREEZE WORST ON APRICOTS, LAMBS, PEACHES, TRUCK

PORTLAND, Ore., April 27.—Some damage was done to winter wheat in the mid-Columbia counties by the severe cold early last week, says the Oregon weekly crop report issued today.

Seeding of spring wheat is complete in places and is progressing rapidly elsewhere. Growth of cereals has been slow, due to cold weather, but somewhat accelerated by higher temperatures at the close of the week.

A little corn has been planted in western localities. Extensive damage was done by frost to peaches and apricots, and some to strawberries, cherries and plums; in the Rogue River valley unheated pear orchards suffered some injury.

Prune thrives have done much damage. Toward the close of the week the weather was very favorable for pollination.

Considerable loss of lambs has resulted from cold weather and lack of feed. Shearing continues.

Early potatoes and garden stuff were killed or held back by frost. Some early planted potatoes have rotted in the ground. Conditions at the close of the week were favorable, and planting of potatoes and truck crops was progressing.

EASTERN OREGON AND IDAHO LAUNCH RAILROAD PROJECT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, Ore., April 27.—A joint conference between public utilities commissions of Oregon and Idaho with a view to ultimately establishing direct rail connections between the eastern Oregon country and Lewiston, Idaho, as well as connecting the northern and southern sections of Idaho, will be held at the Multnomah hotel in Portland on May 5, if tentative arrangements are carried through.

A letter from the Idaho commission was received here this morning by the Oregon commission suggesting the time and place.

The proposal to be considered by the two groups involves filing a petition with the Interstate Commerce Commission asking that the Union Pacific system, of which the O. W. R. & N. is a branch, be required to build a line along the Snake river from Homestead, Oregon, north to Lewiston, Idaho, as well as a branch line from Huntington, on the main O. W. R. & N. line to Homestead.

At the present time the section in Idaho around Lewiston has no railway outlet south, the shortest connection between that section and the southern part of the state being west into Washington, down thru eastern Oregon and east into Idaho. The new line as tentatively proposed would practically follow the Oregon-Idaho boundary directly north and south.

The line would open up the Lewiston country to eastern Oregon as well as to Washington. It would connect the northern Oregon and southern Idaho directly with Lewiston and Spokane.

Letters have been received from a few grange organizations and chambers of commerce in eastern Oregon urging support of the proposed line. The Idaho state legislature passed a joint resolution at the last session to the same effect.

State attempts

to rebuild case

against Dr. Dobbs

SEATTLE, April 27.—By the means of rebuttal witnesses, Prosecutor Ewing D. Colvin today was painstakingly attempting to rebuild the structure of the state's case

against Dr. C. C. Dobbs, Kirkland dentist, on trial in superior court here charged with the murder of Letitia Whitehall, a 14-year-old patient.

The state's case suffered severe onslaught yesterday when Colvin was obliged to withdraw the testimony of the only witnesses who have given direct testimony for the state. The witnesses, William and James Gerard, who said they had seen Dr. Dobbs on a bridge near the spot the slain girl's body was found, with the inert form of a girl, were mistaken as to the night of the occurrence, Colvin said. The defense had practically nullified the Gerard boys' testimony by introducing evidence to prove they were elsewhere on October 30, when the murder was said to have occurred.

In retaliation, Colvin put on the stand rebuttal witnesses to discontinue testimony offered by star witnesses for the defense. Neither Henry Kreiter nor Alice Anderson were where they said they were the night of the murder, Colvin's witnesses testified just before adjournment of court yesterday.

Colvin continued his attacks on defense testimony today, when school companions of Kreiter paraded to the witness stand to establish that he was in Kirkland, not Redmond, where he said he saw Letitia, on the evening of October 30.

The defense scored when Dr. Roy C. West, surgeon, testified he had examined at Prosecutor Colvin's request, the jaw bone of the slain girl. Another doctor had helped him in the examination, he said, and both agreed that the missing tooth had been knocked out by violence and not extracted in a dental operation. He also expressed the opinion novocaine had not been used in the jaw.

The state has contended that Dr. Dobbs extracted a tooth as an excuse to administer novocaine to drug the girl.

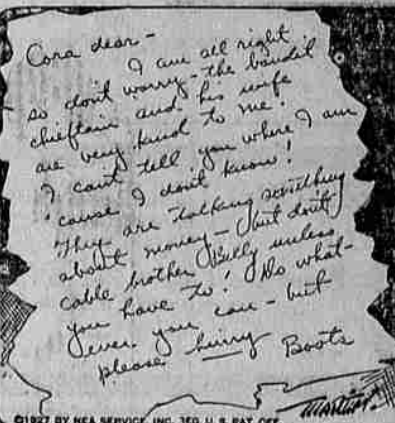

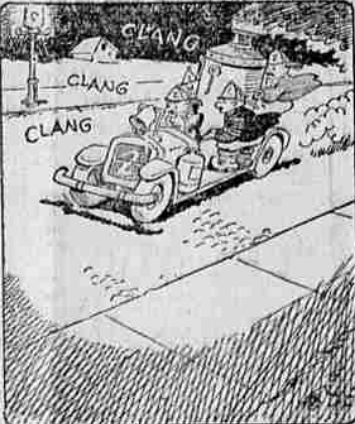

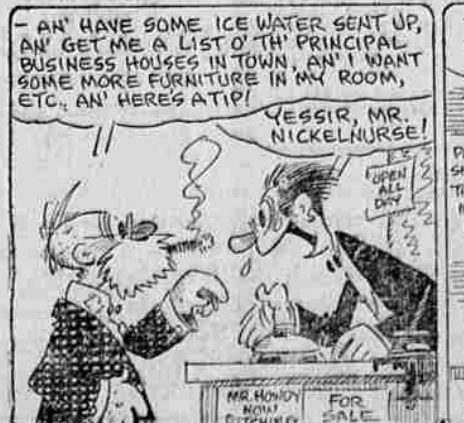
