DOCTOR DOBBS IS NOT GUILTY, JURY AT SEATTLE SAYS

One Ballot Taken to Free Dentist of Charge of Having Murdered School Girl.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SEATTLE, Wash., April 29.—A jury of 12 men has found that Dr. Chester C. Dobbs is innocent of the murder of Letitia Whitehall, 14-year-old school girl, who was brutally attacked and slain near her home six months ago.

The not guilty verdict was returned last night on the first ballot after the jury had deliberated 15 minutes. The case had taken nearly three weeks to try.

Freedom from the murder charge today found the middle-aged dentist facing the very real problem of providing for his family of five which had become destitute during the trial. His wife, Alice, early this week applied for—and received—aid from the county for herself and her four children.

Dr. Dobbs received the verdict of acquittal in the calm manner which characterized his appearance in the courtroom during the long trial.

Murder Remains Unsolved
The new unsolved murder of comely Letitia Whitehall supposedly occurred on October 3. She left home in the afternoon for Dr. Dobbs's office where, he testified at the trial, she received minor dental treatment and left. She did not return home that night and 15 days later her mistreated and beaten body was found in a slough.

Expert testimony that novocaine was found in the girl's body and also of a syringe seized from the accused dentist's office featured the prosecution's case. Testifying in his own behalf, Dr. Dobbs denied that he administered novocaine to the girl and accounted for his whereabouts during the evening of her disappearance.

Evidence that Letitia was seen alive after leaving Dr. Dobbs's office was also introduced by the defense.

COUPLE WED HERE THIS AFTERNOON

At a quiet wedding ceremony attended by only a few guests, Miss Orpha Doty of Gold Hill and L. J. Hewitt of this city were married at 10 o'clock this morning. Rev. R. W. Achord officiating. Mr. and Mrs. Hewitt left immediately following the ceremony for Washington points. They will make their home in this city.

MARKETS

PORTLAND, Ore., April 29.—Cattle market took another tumble on the daily exchange late yesterday afternoon and trading today is at lower prices for all grades except firsts. Extras are down a half cent, all prime firsts. Standards declined a full cent, likewise affecting the exchange price of primals and butterfat automatically. The egg market is steady and unchanged locally.

Under a strong supply, country dressed meats are slightly weaker in price. Fancy veal is selling generally at 17 cents while fancy pork is running from 14 to 15.

Higher prices for onions on the local market have obtained with Oregon Yellow Danvers reaching as high as \$7 per cwt.

In face of a strong demand, millers have announced advances in the prices of all grades of flour. Whole wheat, graham and pastry flour are quoted 25 cents higher. Hard wheat flour is also advanced 20 cents per barrel and bakers' patents are up 40 cents per barrel. Family patents had gone up 20 cents at the close of last week.

Additional towns in Arkansas were threatened and the refugee situation there was becoming increasingly acute. Additional hundreds were being made homeless over the whole area daily and the Red Cross faced a tremendous task in concentrating and caring for them.

Arkansas Levee Breaks
PINE BLUFF, Ark., April 29.—Two thousand feet of levee caved into the Arkansas river today just below the South Bend dyke, Colonel Joe Harris, who is in charge of the work on the South Bend levee, reported.

All motor boats available have been rushed to South Bend from Pine Bluff by the Red Cross committee here. The Choctaw, government boat, arrived here loaded with several days rations.

Colonel Harris said the fight had been concentrated on the bend of the South Bend levee and the cave-in came as a great surprise to the engineers. He said the bend itself, which has been causing much alarm for a week, is holding.
