FOREST WEEK DISPLAY IS OF GREAT VALUE

Exhibits Show What Can Be Accomplished With Oregon Wood.

EXHIBIT IS VARIED

Local Man Proves Craftsmanship With Unusual Display of Wood Products.

A great deal of interest is being shown in the forest week display arranged by the Douglas County Fire Patrol and the forest service. This display is located in the Hochradel building and every resident of Douglas county should avail himself of the opportunity to see this exhibit if a visit can possibly be made. The exhibit shows a number of the different woods cut in Douglas county with the uses to which these woods have been put. Some hardwoods, used

for furniture and veneer are on display, and have been pronounced by experts as the finest to be found in the country. Included in the exhibit is a section of a 67-year-old walnut tree, a tree which grew near Oakland and which sold for \$150. It was purchased by a furniture manufacturer who cut it up for veneer and pronounced it the finest piece of walnut he had ever seen. There are also pieces of many other kinds of wood, some of which are not so well known, and it is shown that some of these woods possess unusually fine properties for furniture manufacture. For instance, there is a piece of madrone, which grows in great abundance in this county. The stave exhibited shows that it can be seasoned and polished and can be used to wonderful advantage. It is already beginning to be used in furniture manufacture, and when its use becomes general Douglas county will be able to furnish a large supply. Finished products made by county manufacturing plants from various Douglas county woods are also on display.

The forest service is making a very interesting exhibit of fire fighting equipment. By far the outstanding feature of the show, however, is the display placed today by Fred Langenberg, local mechanic and woodworker.

As the chief attraction, Mr. Langenberg, who has had a great deal of experience in boat making, is showing one of the most beautiful boats ever seen in the state. This boat is made from Port Orford cedar, and white oak, all of the wood having been cut in Douglas county. It is made with the most expert craftsmanship and the trimming is exceedingly ornate. The bow has been protected with great sheets of hand-hammered copper, while brass trunnions, cast and finished by Mr. Langenberg, provide a hand-holding grip at the bow. The boat is highly polished and forms an exhibit well worth seeing.

It is the property of the Oregon Agricultural college, which purchased it following its completion, but has left it in Mr. Langenberg's care.

Mr. Langenberg is also an expert bowyer and is showing a number of archery bows that he has made. He has for several years been supplying yewwood staves for the market and has also been manufacturing bows for sale. While Oregon white oak has never been considered as bow material, yet Mr. Langenberg has proven that it has all of the qualities necessary for the manufacture of a perfect bow and is exhibiting a weapon made of that material together with the several yewwood bows.

He is also exhibiting five different kinds of wood, Osage orange mountain grown locust, Oregon white oak and yewwood, all of which can be used for bow materials. He is also showing a 14-foot yew plank, and also planks of incense cedar, Port Orford cedar and chickapin oak.

Another interesting display which he has provided is of arrows. He has patterned these after the Ute Indian style, making them of various kinds of wood, which he exhibits, dipping them with various steel points. They are feathered so that they whirl as they are shot giving them greater carrying and penetrating power.

Mr. Langenberg also manufactures a large saddle knife for use by forest rangers, the knife having a heavy silver steel blade with aluminum handle and grip, the lighter metal affording a large gripping and hand-protecting surface, with an adding weight to the knife which is used also for cutting brush and general purposes.

An ammunition chest of Oregon ash with aluminum trim is also attracting much attention. The display was started as an attraction for forest week and has grown to much larger proportions than had been expected. Many people doubtless do not know of the resources the Douglas county has in the way of wood for all kinds of purposes and the exhibit will be of a great deal of interest.
