PORTLAND, Ore., April 30.—With Texas failing to supply the demand in large markets and new crop California onions moving eastward in the emergency, this vegetable has become so short of supply locally that a car of Oregon Yellow Danvers, started for California, has been ordered re-shipped to Portland and is expected the first of the week.

Cabbages are also in supply here far below the demand and Texas and California stocks are holding at \$5 and \$6.50 per cwt. No new districts are shipping in. Better demand in active and prices are firm with no change in bid prices excepting a half cent decline for firsts.

Eggs are also in good demand. Firsts are advanced a cent to 22 cents today following yesterday's exchange meeting.

Hogs and veal prices are still weak and demand slower than usual. Poultry prices are steady.
