AMERICAN LEAGUE RACE BETWEEN 3, VIEWS OF HARRIS

(By The Associated Press.) "The Athletics have the pitching but the Yankees have the smooth-working team"—if you listen to the words of Bucky Harris.

At least that's the way Washington's youthful manager sums up his estimate of the two clubs generally picked to fight it out for the American league pennant. Generally picked, that is, by most of the experts except Harris, who asserts that the Senators can't be counted out by any means.

It might be presumed that Bucky would favor the Mackman, who have walloped the Senators in five out of six games, whereas Washington and New York have split the only two games they have played.

Far from conceding either of his two eastern rivals the pennant at this stage of the race, however, Harris is confident the Senators will strike their stride soon and make it a three cornered battle in which any one of the western clubs, especially Detroit or Chicago, may join.

Ty Cobb, Philadelphia critics believe, has supplied the "popper" that Harris discerns in the Mack machine.

For a man supposed to be on his "last legs," Cobb has exhibited some spy footwork, including two home runs, a critical mullin, his batting eye is undimmed, but it is noticeable that the Georgian has far less range in the field than of yore.

Ty has been imparting a few of his tricks, however, to his teammates, even if he can't do them all himself any more. The results have been plainly evident, especially in the work of Al Simmons, hard hitting center fielder. Cobb and Simmons are room mates while the Athletics are on the road.
