KINGS PRODUCTS STOCKHOLDERS SHY AT NASSAU OFFER

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

PORTLAND, Ore., May 2.—An offer of settlement made to the stockholders of the Kings Food Products company several months ago by the Nassau company, successors to Ladd and Tilton Bank, has been withdrawn because the proposal has not been accepted by a sufficient number of the stockholders, according to a statement made today by E. B. MacNaughton, president of the Nassau company.

The Nassau company offered to stand back of a reorganization of the Kings Food Products company, to turn over to the organization the packing and dehydrating plants at Salem and The Dalles and all other property of the defunct company free of indebtedness; pay \$125,000 to be used as operating capital; and reimburse the litigants for the full amount of their expenses in conducting litigation, providing two-thirds of them would exchange their Kings Food Products company stock for stock in the new company. The affairs of the company were to be administered by a board of trustees of five prominent business men who were in no way connected with the old Kings Food Products company.

The chief litigants included in

what is known as the stockholders' committee, representing about one-third of the stock of the Kings Food Products company and a small group of California stockholders represented by W. S. U'ken were favorable to the proposed settlement, but there were few of the unorganized stockholders who agreed to the proposal, it was reported.

"The entire matter is now in the same position as before the offer for settlement was made," said MacNaughton. "The litigants can now take the matter into court, but those who have not brought court action have no recourse."

John F. Reilly, one of the attorneys for the stockholders' committee said today that this organization is still negotiating for a settlement.

NORMAN QUEST TO BE CELEBRATED NEXT JUNE

HASTINGS, Eng., May 1.—(A. P.)—Towns on both the English and French sides of the English channel are preparing to celebrate in June the 900th anniversary of the birth of William the Conqueror, who led his Norman hordes to victory here in the conquest of England in 1066.

The main English celebration, at Hastings, will include a ceremony in the ruins of Hastings castle and a pilgrimage to Battle, the scene of the final encounter when King Harold was slain.

Those taking part in the ceremonies an pageantry will wear Norman and Saxon costumes. Descendants of William's conquering legions, who are almost as numerous in this country as Mayflower descendants are in America, will participate in the celebrations.

Resolved, that in view of the fact that much material of historical value and interest in the form of letters, journals, diaries, printed newspapers and state documents, and museum articles, is passing into the hands of private collectors and being sent out of the state, the residents of Oregon be requested to communicate with the Oregon Historical Society, or an officer thereof, before parting with any such material; and that the press be asked to assist in placing this request in the hands of the public.

SALEM, Ore., May 2.—Action to facilitate establishment of rail connections between Bend and Klamath Falls was taken by the Oregon State Public Service commission here this morning when the commission took action to wire a petition to the interstate commerce commission urging that the name Great Northern be substituted at once for the Oregon Trunk Line on the certificate of necessity and convenience formerly issued by the federal commission. The certificate was issued to the Great Northern and Northern Pacific railways under the name Oregon Trunk Line, owned jointly by the two companies. The Northern Pacific later withdrew.

Representations had been made to the public service commission urging that this morning's action be taken. The petition will be drawn up and forwarded to the interstate commerce commission by wire tonight.

HANGMAN'S NOOSE WORN BY AMERICAN SOLDIERS

FORT NIAGARA, N. Y., May 1.—(A. P.)—If the average American soldier were ordered to wear a hangman's noose about his neck he might feel insulted, yet a hangman's noose, says Col. R. E. Ingram of the 25th Infantry here, was the origin of the now highly prized fourragere or shoulder cords worn by certain regiments of the United States army. The Flemish regiment under the Spanish Duke of Alva in the Netherlands so conducted itself on the field of battle that the duke considered himself disgraced and ordered that repetition of such conduct would be punished by hanging. The Flemings appeared in the next engagement with ropes and nails on their shoulders and so distinguished themselves that the decoration came to be regarded as a mark of honor.

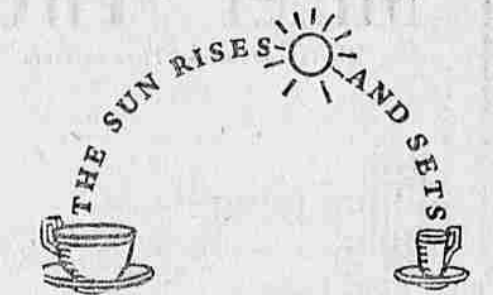
