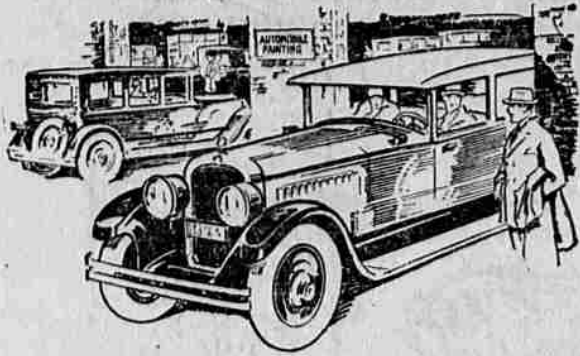

The Land Grant Money
There is resistance to the claim of the state government for a share of the land grant refund by the county courts and other citizens in the land grant counties were working hard. They wrote letters, distributed literature, made arguments and sent delegations to Washington. The bill was their bill, not the state's bill, and, as it is argued at Klamath Falls, the money was to be the money of the counties, not state money.

And when you come to think of it, whatever may develop legally, if the state government goes to the courts to collect a share in the refund, in morals, the land grant money belongs to the land grant counties.—Portland Journal.
