EXHIBITS FROM SCENE OF CRIME GET INTO COURT

(Continued from page 1.)

Stanford University graduate, in 1923, a Southern Pacific employee, engaged in survey work near the tunnel, was the second witness. A map of the crime scene, made from measurements under the direction of railroad special agents the week following the crime, was temporarily withdrawn, to allow him to make elimination in the lettering on the map, to which the state objected. He will be recalled as a witness.

Attorneys Tilt
During the afternoon session the trial dragged thru interruptions. Two or three times, members of the jury complained they could not hear distinctly, and the court admonished the witnesses to speak loud and clearly.

There were heated moments between opposing counsel. The overflow crowd filled every seat and half the main aisle, and they waited with anxiety for the thrill of the trial.

Leon Fornerook, former Jackson county deputy sheriff, followed William Flackus, of Ashland, railroad worker, on the stand. Fornerook was the official to whom Bonderstrom turned over the exhibits, and he further identified them, as did Flackus.

Court Room Jammed
HOUSE, Jacksonville, Ore., May 5.—The opening of the fourth day of the trial of Hugh DeAutremont, alleged Siskiyou tunnel bandit, on trial for the murder of Charles O. (Coyle) Johnson of Ashland, Southern Pacific trainmen, found citizens of all ages flocking to the court house, for a coveted seat. They came in taxis, in their own automobiles, on horseback and in bugles. Many staidy women brought their noon lunches and cushions.

Included in the spectators were high school students of Medford and Jacksonville who had played "hooky," to be spectators. The tiny court room was packed three quarters of an hour before the opening of court.

When court opened, Paul DeAutremont of Eugene, Ore., father of the defendant, was seated by his side, across from Mrs. Belle DeAutremont of Lakewood, N. M., the wife from whom he has been estranged for many years.

The youthful prisoner, in a new suit of dull brown, still composed and clam, and freshly shaved, but sat erect in his chair and eyed straightforwardly the jury, the spectators and Dr. Lawrence George of Tacoma, who identified a picture of Mall Clerk Daugherty as the man whose body he had seen in the wrecked mail car after the holdup.

Cross examination by Attorney Newbury of the defense, questioned the reliability of Dr. George's identification in the dark shadows of the car.

Dr. George was excused as a witness and Mrs. Blanche Rinebarger, widow of the slain mail clerk, E. E. Daugherty, was called to the stand, identified the picture of her former husband, and was excused without questioning by the defense.

Crime Map Exhibited
W. R. Wilson, civil engineer, a graduate of Stanford University, and former Southern Pacific employee, at the time of the holdup engaged in survey work near the east portal of Siskiyou tunnel. He was among the first to arrive on the scene and took preliminary measurements, he testified, including the distance to the blasting machine on the hillside, under the direction of Special Agent Ortega and Conductor Merrett. A week later he made a survey of the two camps, in which the state alleges, the defendant and his brothers, Roy and Ray, jointly accused, lived while plotting the crime. A map of the scene, purporting to show all pivotal spots of the crime scene was offered as exhibit No. 6 for the state. Wilson is the sixteenth witness for the prosecution, Wilson was excused to erase from the map certain lettering to which the defense objected.

Carl Bonderstrom, section foreman at Siskiyou, was then called and testified to finding and identifying the eroded gunnysack footprints, the detonating battery, the wire leading therefrom to the blasted mail car, the three knapsacks left behind by the bandits and the mail overalls, the legs cut off, in the custom of loggers, found in the Mountcrest cabin.

The state contends it will link the defendant and his fugitive brothers to the purchase and use of the various articles, in the conspiring and commission of the holdup. The detonating battery and the wire were introduced as evidence over defense objection.

Cross-Examined
On cross-examination Bonderstrom testified to the coming of the sight-seers and that when he discovered the wire, he said to one and all:

"Here is the tell-tale."
Attorney Collier, of the defense, grilled the witness and drew from him the admission that though he regarded the detonating battery and wire as the crux of the crime, he placed no identification mark upon it.

Asked to examine the battery, the witness discovered the initials "C. B." He was uncertain as to who, or when they had been placed there. The defense centered on why Bonderstrom had failed to mark some of the articles, but had marked others.

High followed closely every word of the witness with high interest, especially when he testified he failed to pick up the overalls, and that there had been no apparent effort to conceal the incriminating articles.

Overall Cause Clash
A clash of opposing counsel came this morning during the cross-examination of former Deputy Sheriff Leon D. Fornerook, who testified to receiving from Section

Foreman Bonderstrom state exhibits including the blue denim overalls found near the detonating battery at the scene of the hold-up of the Southern Pacific train. Fornerook testified under questioning by the defense, "that I examined most of the pockets."
On redirect examination by Special Prosecutor George Roberts, the witness went into more details. The special prosecutor then held up the garment and put his fingers in the bib-pocket, to illustrate his question.
Attorney John Collier of the defense, picking up the overalls, said:

"Counsel has just run his fingers into this pocket, and asked you if there was any other pockets. Was it necessary for him to do that?"

The fiery special prosecutor leaped to his feet with the shout: "We object! It's unfair and you know it!"

The court sustained the objection and when the suave Portland attorney repeated his query, the special aide of the state again flared. The antagonistic query was for the third time asked and when Attorney Roberts filed a vigorous protest, the court admonished the barristers to desist.

Judge Rebukes Crowd
A titter from the audience brought a rebuke from the bench: "This is a trial of a serious nature. I want it understood, there will be no interruption from spectators. No warning should be enough."

The laughter passed as quickly as it brewed.
Dr. W. W. P. Holt, county physician at the time of the murders, who conducted an autopsy over the victims, was on the stand as the morning session drew to a close, the state setting forth to establish a corpus delicti.

Savage Murder Shown
Grim and ghastly surprise testimony and heretofore hidden developments, came into the trial late this morning.

The unexpected element was furnished by Dr. W. W. P. Holt, Medford, former county physician, who testified that on April 22, last, acting under the direction of the state's attorney, the body of Johnson was examined and re-examined, revealing that a wound in the right shoulder and ranging downward, regarded lightly, heretofore, held vital importance, and furnishing a new light on the savagery that marked the attempted holdup and the quadruple murders.

Dr. Holt testified to the belief that the shoulder wound was inflicted by a larger missile than the seven buckshot wounds in the abdomen, held to have been the cause of Johnson's death.

It will be the theory of the state that Johnson while stooped in agony from his shotgun wounds, that he was shot from above and that the larger missile is of the same calibre as the shells they alleged the defendant and his fugitive jointly-accused brothers purchased and used in preliminary target practice and commission of the holdup, and as outlined in the opening statement.

The wound, caused by the larger missile, Dr. Holt testified entered the right shoulder, ranged downward and came out near the right nipple. He testified that the bullet causing this wound had not been found and reviewed his former testimony on the nature and extent of Johnson's injuries.

Dr. Holt was still on the stand when court recessed at noon.
The defendant visibly paled during the testimony of the physician, but showed no emotion, listening with high intensity to every word.

The state admitted that the Holt testimony was a high point in the trial and an important link in the chain of circumstantial evidence.

COURT OF HONOR TONIGHT
A Court of Honor for the Roseburg Scouts will be held at the city hall this evening at seven thirty. This will be the last opportunity for local Scouts to pass tests which will apply on the Troop quotas for the Achievement Round-Up which began March first.
