TEMPERATURE FOR MONTH OF APRIL ABOVE AVERAGE

Despite the fact that April was branded as a cold, wet month the monthly weather report shows that it was warmer than the average and that the rainfall was not as heavy as usual. The mean temperature for the month, which is the average of the minimum and maximum for each day of the month, is 51.4 degrees, while the normal for the month is 51 degrees, giving an average excess temperature of .4 of a degree.

The total precipitation for the month was 1.50 inches, while the normal is 2.45 inches. Referring back to temperature, the coldest reading for the month was 28 degrees and the highest 86 degrees. The greatest daily range was 44 degrees and the least daily range was 11 degrees.

The average hourly wind velocity for the month was 3.5 miles per hour, while the strongest wind recorded during the month was 25 miles per hour.

There were 9 clear days, 4 partly cloudy, 17 cloudy. There were fifteen days in which precipitation was recorded.

The report was compiled by A. W. Pugh, meteorologist in charge of the local U. S. Weather Bureau station.

O. A. C. TO INSTALL TWO NEW BRANCHES

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 5.—Regents of Oregon Agricultural College yesterday established an experiment station and graduate school in engineering, placing the engineering department at this college on a par with that of any land grant institution in the country.

Dean G. A. Corvill, who has been on the Oregon Agricultural College faculty for 38 years and dean of the school of engineering since its establishment in 1908, was made director of the experiment station and dean of graduate work in engineering.

H. S. Rogers, professor of hydraulics and irrigation, was promoted to succeed Dean Corvill as dean of the undergraduate engineering school. S. H. Graf was made assistant director of the experiment station.

RADIO STATION TO BROADCAST TALK ON PARKER PRUNE PLAN

For several years, in fact since the raise in prices at the time of the World war, there has been no satisfactory marketing plan in operation dealing with the dried prune production of the northwest. Some attempts have been made from time to time to organize the growers on some selling plan, but owing to the prevailing prices realized by the growers for their finished product very little progress in the way of marketing organization could be made.

This condition existed for such a length of time, and the unfavorable results became so prominent that the United States Bureau of Economics made a careful survey and analysis of the situation. The results of this analysis have been fully explained by C. J. Hard and Clayton L. Lohr, specialists from the extension service of the college, at a series of prune growers meetings held in the county this week.

Following this an analysis of the "Parker plan" for marketing California's prune crop will be broadcast from KOAC, radio station of the Oregon Agricultural college, at 8:55 p. m., May 9, by C. J. Hard, marketing specialist of the college extension service.

The "Parker plan," devised by Joseph M. Parker, provides that growers shall pool their prunes and that packers shall market the pool. When the convention of 100 prune growers assembled at the college on May 31 and June 1 to consider means of pulling their industry out of the mire, this plan will no doubt be considered along with other proposals that may be made to stabilize the prune industry.

The convention of 100 prune growers will be made up of delegates from all prune growing sections of the Pacific northwest, to be selected by the growers themselves.

ASTORIA, Ore., May 5.—Approximately 200 acres of farm land were inundated as the result of collapse of a short stretch of dike near Brownstead, east of here, yesterday.

The break was believed to have been caused by pressure of freshet waters in the Columbia river, backed up by high tide, at a spot where the dike had been weakened by beavers. Two dredges were immediately put to work repairing the gap, which is between 50 and 80 feet in length.

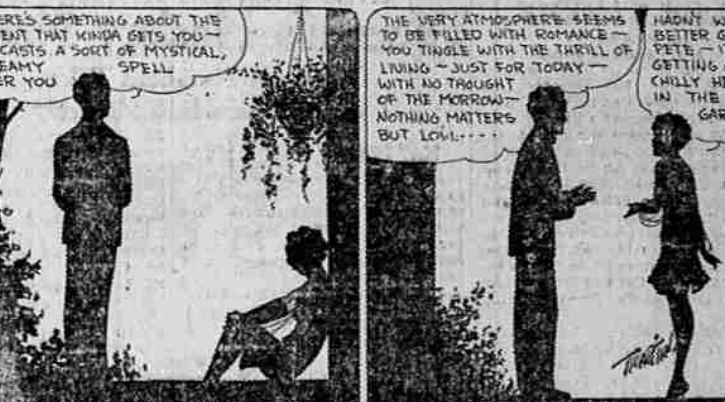

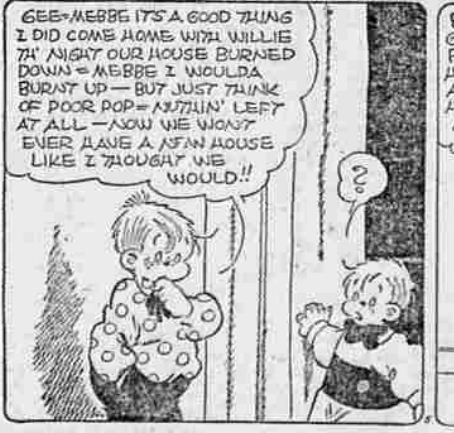
