AMADEE M. SMITH
IS NAMED TRUSTEE
OF THE TELEGRAM

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., May 6.—Amadee M. Smith was today appointed trustee in bankruptcy of The Telegram Publishing company. His bond was fixed at \$10,000. Smith had been receiver under appointment of state and federal courts.

The appointment was made by A. M. Cannon, federal referee in bankruptcy at a hearing of the creditors.

A resolution was offered by Robert T. Platt, attorney for the United States National Bank, authorizing the trustee to continue to publish The Telegram.

This resolution was adopted, after which Platt proposed another empowering the trustee to sell the assets of the paper as a whole or in part at a private sale or to call for sealed bids, to be accompanied by certified checks of 10 per cent of the bid.

This broad power was objected to by George W. Joseph, who suggested that the sale should be made only by sealed bids.

Referee Cannon declared that if an advantageous private offer was made it will be considered but he declared that the general rule calls for sealed bids and these will be asked for if it is thought best.

"I don't expect these resolutions or any other to interfere with what is best to be done in this matter," said Cannon.

The referee announced that another meeting of the creditors will be held Monday, May 23.

POSTOFFICE TO REFUSE TO SHIP GUNS AFTER MAY 10

The postoffice department has ordered postmasters all over the country to refuse to accept firearms as mail matter after May 10. Postmaster Heinline, announced today. Firearms from individual to individual will not be accepted at any postoffice in the country. However, manufacturers will be allowed to send guns to authorized dealers, and dealers will be allowed to mail back weapons in the regular business routine. However, the manufacturer and the dealer will each be required to make out affidavits and file them with the postmaster at the place where the shipment originates.

These offices have no Sunday delivery and the perishables are not apt to be in good condition on Monday. We would recommend that a special delivery stamp be affixed to these packages so that they will be delivered on Sunday before they become damaged. The extra cost is not unreasonable and will insure prompt delivery of the package to the person to whom it is mailed."
