STRIKE CURB BILL WARMLY FOUGHT IN BRITISH COMMONS

(Associated Press United Wire.)

LONDON, May 6—The trades union bill, born of last year's general strike, has passed the second reading in the House of Commons and today was in the hands of the committee of the whole house. It will receive further consideration next Tuesday. Laborites have submitted hundreds of amendments.

The measure, the object of which is to prevent general strikes and strikes of a coercive nature, was the subject of acrimonious debate throughout the week. Up to the end of last night's session the laborites made every effort to defeat the bill.

It passed the second reading after a motion by John Robert Clynes to reject it was defeated, 365 to 171. Clynes had to be invoked to prevent the laborites from persisting with the debate beyond the customary hour, and the speaker reprimanded the laborites for singing "John Brown's Body" and "Glory Hallelujah" during the voting.

Former Premier Lloyd George, for the laborites, and Philip Snowden, former chancellor of the exchequer, for the laborites, voiced their objections to the bill. S. Saklatvala, communist, denounced the government as a "gang of conspirators and forgers."

Second division teams staged a general uprising yesterday in the American league. Outstanding in the results was the taming of Yankee sluggers by Washington's recruit right hander, Horace Lisenbee. The former Memphis boy cut the Hugmen down with six hits and fanned them, 6 to 1.

Two intentional passes to Hellman and Blue in the ninth inning failed to accomplish their purpose for the Chicago White Sox. The free tickets loaded the bases with Detroit players and Mart McManus picked as the "soft spot," spoiled the party by singling to center. Gehlenger came across with the winning run, 3 to 2.

Ira Flugstad's pinch home run gave the Red Sox their fourth victory of the season, 3 to 2, at the expense of the Athletics.
