COMSTOCK FIRM TO
ESTABLISH PLANT
IN COOS COUNTY

MYRTLE POINT, Ore., May 6.—
John Comstock and son, Theodore,
of Comstock, were in this district
recently arranging to install a box
factory and shingle mill on Hall
creek. Comstock and son Monday
closed a deal for the purchase of
the timber on 160 acres on Hall's
creek belonging to C. Watkins. In-
cluded in the timber is red cedar,
alder and old growth fir. Comstock
and his sons are running a plant at
Comstock, where they are making
20,000 shingles a day and turning
out a considerable quantity of box
es and crates.

finding near the rendezvous of the
bandits in the Stakysous a can of
salad oil, a bullet-riddled tin can,
five exploded .45 calibre pistol
shells and an exploded dynamite
cap, identified previously as sim-
ilar to those stolen from an Oregon
City construction camp in 1923,
and a tree stripped by an explo-
sion of bark and limbs. The blast
the state will hold was a test by
the bandits.

His explorations in the crime vi-
cinity revealed 65 trees used as tar-
gets, from which the five bullets
were extracted and presented as
evidence.

Hint of the Defense

A hint of what the defense will
offer as its contention—the first
linking along this line—since the
opening of the trial, came this
morning during the cross examina-
tion of Ramirez.

"Is it not a fact," asked Attor-
ney John A. Collier of Portland,
"that after the crime you and Dan
O'Donnell, chief of Southern Pa-
cific special agents, reported and
advanced as a theory, that the
crime was one for revenge and
that the reason that the four train-
men were killed was for the pur-
pose of preventing identification?"

Ramirez answered "no," and the
state's objections to further ques-
tioning on the subject were sus-
tained by the court.

Judge Warns Lawyers

The last hour of the morning
session was enlivened by another
volcanic clash, between opposing
counsel. United States District At-
torney Neuner protested the man-
ner and attitude of Attorney Col-
lier towards Ramirez, flinging
whiplike queries and retorts at
him, linged with sarcasm.

The court cautioned the attor-
neys to be calm in their words and
their manners with the admoni-
shment:

"You attorneys know how to
conduct this case as well as I do,
and there is no necessity of argu-
ments of a trivial nature. I expect
the case to be tried in a short
time and along that line we will
proceed."

In his way back to his cell at
noon, de Autment passed by an-
other picture. "I see by the papers
that I like to have my picture tak-
en," said the defendant. "I don't,
but I can't get out of it."

Ramirez was excused from the
witness stand and Vincent Arce-
gas, another Southern Pacific in-
vestigator, with headquarters at
Sacramento, was called. He assist-
ed Ramirez in his exploration of
three weeks at and near the
scene of the holdup.

Few of the spectators in the
courtroom left their seats during
the mid-day intermission and there
was an afternoon rush for seats.
The fair sex made up a large por-
tion of the audience. Unlike the
previous days, the aisles and win-
dow sills were unoccupied and a
lane attorney was perched on the
space in front of the judge's bench.

The court house yard was alive
with Medford and Jacksonville
school students who played hockey
to attend the trial and were in-
vited this morning by a court order.

The state will conclude its di-
rect testimony late Monday or
early Tuesday morning, according
to Attorney Neuner. The remaining
35 or 40 witnesses will give short
testimony, he said.

According to Attorney Gus New-
bury of the defense counsel they
will have 15 or 20 witnesses, and
will take more than two days for
the presentation of their testi-
mony, including the reading of
depositions bearing on the previous
good character of the defendant.

The indications are the final
arguments to the jury will be pre-
sented the last of next week.

WATCHMAN ADMITS
ROBBING FIRM OF
SILKS, 600 HATS

PORTLAND, Ore., May 6.—Theft
of more than 600 hats and a
quantity of silks from Blair-Raas
company, in the Royal building,
was confessed to police today by
Gus Eichner, night watchman for
the company, police said. Part of
the loot had been given to Ethel
Mason, in Portland, and part was
sent to friends in Pendleton. Of-
ficers reported. Detective said
they watched Eichner give two of
the stolen hats to the girl on a
street corner. She was held as a
material witness.

home in Salt Lake City for more

ing. The boy is the son of David
Baker, railroad engineer, of 21
First East street, Salt Lake City.

The officers have wired the
boy's parents that he is in Pen-
dleton.
