BOXING SEASON FINALE MARKED BY GOOD BOUTS

Blackwell and Kelly Draw
in Great Battle That
Delights Crowd.

2 KNOCKOUTS STAGED

Martel Disposes of Danny
Morrison in 5th; Jorege
Puts Bye to Sleep
in the Second.

The last boxing card of the local season came to a close at the armory last night with a good sized crowd of excited fans on their feet cheering wildly at the finish of the 10-round main event between Joe Blackwell, of Eugene, and "Flash" Kelly, of Portland, substituting for Danny Garth, who was reported hurt in an accident. Kelly, as tough as two hickory trees, fought on sheer nerve and absorbed enough punishment from his faster opponent to have finished any ordinary scrapper. For eight successive rounds Blackwell hammered Kelly all around the ring, keeping him against the ropes most of the time and sending him to the canvas three times, twice in the fifth round and again in the seventh. In the ninth round Kelly, after seeming on the verge of a knockout, electrified the crowd by a rally in which he brought a crimson smear on Blackwell's face to match his own condition. In the tenth Kelly fully held his own in the fiercest exchange of the whole bout and at the close Blackwell was again bleeding and noticeably groggy. Referee Tom Hagen declared the argument a draw and the crowd yelled its approval.

In the opening round it looked like a one-sided affair, with an early victory for Blackwell, who came here with an unbroken record of triumphs, all knockouts. Garth's failure to appear was a disappointment to the fans at first, but as his substitute constantly weathered Blackwell's barrage from round to round with an exhibition of gameness never excelled in the local fight arena, the crowd forgot all about Garth and became enthusiastic rooters for the fighting son of Erin. The battle was a fitting finale for the season and one that will live long in the memory of those who forgot past displeasures and came out to see the bill.

Other Bouts Also Good
In a hard fought semi-final, Tony Martel, a Filipino, of Montecito, 130 pounds, who appeared here on a previous card, won by a knockout over Danny Morrison, of Salem, in the fifth round. Morrison was a constant aggressor until he took the count of nine in the middle of the fourth round. Before the round ended he took another count just within the limit, but the bell a few seconds later saved him for the time being. He attempted to stall through the fifth by hanging on at every opportunity, but when the round was half over he took two severe jolts to the jaw in succession and went down for the fatal ten.

The special event between Andy Jorege and Kid Bye, 118 pounders, both of Marion county, only lasted 20 seconds less than two rounds, but it was a whirlwind give-and-take affair that drew a big hand from the ringside. Jorege won by a knockout on the third time that he floored Bye in the second period.

Floyd James, 175 pounds, of this city, and Eddie Smith, of Vancouver, Wash., 165, staged a great four round draw. It looked like curtains for Smith when the end of the first round found him in distress against the ropes. In the second round he fared no better. In the third he rallied and got an even break and in the fourth he had the bigger man visibly tired. The draw decision pleased the crowd.

Two sets of local youngsters were in the other preliminaries. Jesse James and Harold Sayers drew in three lively rounds. Kid Prongerast got the decision over Ivan Starmer at the end of the second round when the latter was too hopelessly worried to warrant continuance of the fight.

The Washington State College track team will arrive today and will have a light workout in preparation for tomorrow's dual meet. Neither team seems to have much in the way of starting material, but on the surface the visiting Cougars appear to have the edge on the meet.

AUTO CRASH KILLS ONE MAN, INJURES ANOTHER FATALY

SAN DIEGO, Calif., May 6.—One man was killed, another was injured, probably fatally, and another was injured so seriously that he also may die, when the automobile in which they were riding crashed into a concrete abutment at an overhead bridge twelve miles north of Oceanside, on the coast highway last night.

The dead man is Jack Domagala, 255 Grand Avenue, Los Angeles. The injured: Charles E. Meader, Portland, Oregon, crushed chest, broken nose, serious body cuts, left eye gouged out and internal injuries. He is not expected to live. Roy Smith of Azusa, Calif., sustained cuts on the body and internal injuries which may prove fatal.

HEAVILY INSURED MURDER VICTIM'S BROTHER IS HELD

ST. LOUIS, May 6.—Facing a barrage of questions today in connection with the death of his elder brother, Clifford M. Hicks, slain law associate of former Governor Elliott W. Major, Glenn T. Hicks today occupied a conspicuous role in the dramatic turn taken yesterday by the police investigation of the crime.

Named as the beneficiary of most of the estate and \$365,000 insurance of the dead man, who was a former minister turned financier, Hicks was arrested yesterday with two former convicts, William Davis and Harry W. Boetelman.

Five hours of grilling at the hands of authorities brought out the announcement from Chief of Detectives Kaiser that he believed solution of the baffling mystery was near. He openly accused Hicks of being the instigator of his brother's death, after Hicks was unable to explain why he knew of the murder two hours before the body was found last Sunday morning in a clump of bushes outside of town.

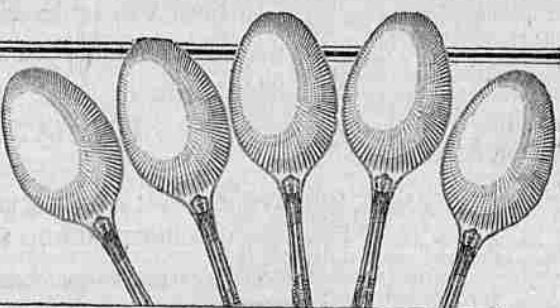
