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Seventeen-Year-Old Canadian Boy on 25,000-Mile Hike With Arms Shackled; Trying to Regain Health

With his hands once more shackled in front of him, a smiling determination still written across his face and a fifty pound pack on his back, Lionel "Happy" Edwards, 17 years old Canadian youth from Quebec City is again on his way after a delay of nearly three months.

"Happy" pedaled into Medford, Ore., some three months ago riding on a new and brilliant bicycle, a gift of the city of Chico, Cal., with only \$800 more miles remaining from the 25,000 mile journey that he undertook last May, in a last attempt to defeat the undertakers.

But on his way to Grants Pass young Edwards was the victim of a "hit-and-run" driver. He was side-swiped into the Rogue River, his bike smashed beyond all repair and five of his ribs broken. He spent two months in Medford recovering from the effects of the accident and then still determined to win out, he started out, he started on foot once more.

"Happy" arrived in Roseburg yesterday afternoon and entering the offices of the News-Review, told us of his various adventures and why he is making his lone jaunt across the continent with his arms handicapped by a very efficient-looking pair of handcuffs. Since the time he was ten years old "Happy" has always looked after himself, having no relatives that he knows of. Late last winter he and his pal, Larry Rae, obtained positions in a home-town shoe factory, where they worked for five months. At the end of that time, discovering that they were losing weight rapidly, they consulted physicians and underwent a week's treatment. The doctors then gravely informed the lads that the chalk, which is used extensively in shoe manufacture, had entered their lungs and as there was no known method of removing it they could not live a month.

Finally they stated that if it was possible for the youths to change their climatic conditions constantly, depending on the fact that the reaction of the various atmospheres in different parts might eventually loosen the chalk and they would be able to exhale it. The medical men, backed by a firm of underwriters, offered to place a stake of \$1,000 that they could not live to reach El Paso, Texas, and return to their homes, the only condition imposed were that they go handcuffed together and without asking aid on the way.

The boys accepted and on the 26th of May left Quebec in search of health, with no money and no equipment and the cards seemingly already stacked against them. They successfully reached Boston, Mass., but there Larry collapsed and despite Boston's most expert medical attention, passed away five days later.

After communicating with the doctors, "Happy" worked three weeks as a dish-washer, to pay the funeral expenses of his dead pal, and continued on his way alone, this time a shiny new pair of "bracelets" on his own wrists. The handcuffs are sealed and welded on him and are for the purpose of making him easily recognizable wherever he may go.

On his pack he bears the names of many mayors, governors, senators, movie stars and well known athletes, including Jack Dempsey and Babe Ruth. He also has the personal seals and best wishes from 82 mayors and 21 governors and that "Happy" is no ordinary globe-trotter is evidenced by a personally autographed photo of President Coolidge. In Los Angeles he made the acquaintance of no less than sixty-five prominent stars each of whom also presented him with a personally autographed photo. He dined with several and the pleasure of kissing Miss Patsy Ruth Miller, the laker on a dare.

Young Edwards has walked about 15,000 miles and has met up with many adventures. Lost in the Carolina swamps for twenty-four hours without food or decent water, he was forced to sleep in a tree with only his belt to prevent his falling into a bottomless depth of slime. He was twice bitten by snakes, trapped in a brush fire, nearly drowned in the Imperial Valley flood and while passing through Arkansas was fired on as an escaped criminal. He considers the high-spot of them all, however, was when he ventured down into Sonora, Mexico, to obtain photos of the rebellious and dangerous Yaqui. When it was explained what he wanted and was doing, through a Mexican officer he was accorded most hospitable treatment and with due ceremony, made a brother of the tribe. When he wished to return he was escorted to the border by three stoical Yaqui who risked their lives in very unhealthy territory to show him the courtesy of a "brother."

"No," he replied, "hiking is very little fun. You must face all sorts of weather and people with a smile and its pretty tough at times. To make my expenses I write for the newspapers and sell a little souvenir myself. All my hotel accommodations are complimentary through the hotel managers' association. But it's no joke to tramp in ankle-deep mud or across the desert with the sun at 120 degrees and ponder on the source of your forthcoming meal. If you think it's fun try it."

From here he goes north to Vancouver, B. C. and hopes to reach his home some time in September. And so he plods on, seldom stopping nor resting yet always smiling and he chases the

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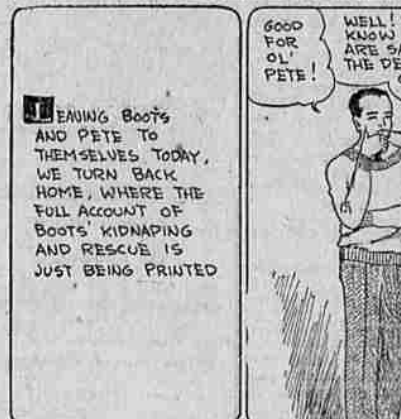
