JARDINE PLEDGES FEDERAL AID TO WHEAT RAISERS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 7.—Assurance of government support for a suitable national cooperative grain marketing organization from Secretary of Agriculture Jardine, today brought forecasts of a federation of American pools from delegates to the international wheat pool conference here.

In a conference with middle western growers yesterday, Secretary Jardine announced that the government was ready to give strong financial support to the right sort of cooperative marketing movement.

Long time government loans to the growers, totaling \$25,000,000 or perhaps more, would be available, the secretary indicated, provided the growers devised and presented an acceptable plan. The plans should be worked out in detail by the farmers themselves he said.

The proposal for a national cooperative organization was in line with a resolution adopted by the 300 delegates urging wheat producers of the chief exporting countries to push negotiations for coordination under a world marketing policy. Russian, Canadian and Australian delegates joined American growers in support of the resolution.

This, delegates believed, would stabilize prices and eliminate many undesirable features attributed to competition between world pools operating without a uniform policy. In addition to group meetings today looking to formulation of plans for a national pool, several executives of marketing organizations were to address the conference on details of various systems now in use in Canada and this country. The conference will adjourn today. The 1928 meeting will be held in Canada.

(Continued from page 1.) work, and forced to fight for everything they had, the entire family were naturally possessed of great physical strength. When Hudson was a boy of 15 he had won considerable fame as a wrestler, having thrown all comers at several county fairs. Yet he never was able to beat his sister Lucy, four years his senior, who could throw him in less than a minute. He attracted so much attention as a wrestler that a New York promoter

induced him to engage in several bouts at a Houston Street, New York resort, to which he threw several well-known wrestlers, including Matt Grace, then champion of the United States. The man who was to become known as a dignified intellectual scientist a few years later could have been a professional wrestler from that moment, but "Murder's Row," as that section of Houston Street was then called, failed to attract him.

In connection with his physical power, it may be added that Mr. Maxim had a marvelous chest and throat development, with vocal chords which enabled him to be heard in articulate speech more than a mile away.

Casualties Strew Progress. His experiments with dynamite, nitroglycerine, gun cotton and other explosives resulted in many half-breed escapes, yet he never seemed to fear the dangerous substances with which he was associated for so many years. He had seen his assistants blown to atoms upon several occasions, had buildings shattered over his head, and great pieces of metal imbedded in the walls around him upon countless occasions, yet he never relaxed in his efforts to increase the power of explosives. His own gift to science was his left hand, which was blown off in an experiment with "maximite."

Mr. Maxim married, in 1896, Miss Lilian Durban, daughter of the Rev. W. Durban, A. M., a well known linguist and litterateur of London, England.

DIPHTHERIA TEST TO BE GIVEN IN ROSE SCHOOL MONDAY

There are two cases of diphtheria in the county, both complicated by scarlet fever. Dr. Thompson, county health officer, reports, these two cases are also the only scarlet fever cases remaining in the county. One of these is in Roseburg and the other in Glendale.

Cuttings have been taken from the throats of the children in the grades affected, with the result that, one carrier has been found in the Rose school and none at Glendale.

Dr. Thompson states that Schick tests to determine susceptibility to diphtheria will be given at the Rose school Monday. This is merely a preliminary precaution in the event more cases should appear. If the latter emergency should develop all exposed, susceptible children should be given the prophylactic injection of antitoxin, which gives immunity lasting about six weeks.

This passive immunization must not be confused with the active immunization against diphtheria consisting of three weekly injections of toxo-antitoxin which does not produce immunity for several months, but lasts many years, Dr. Thompson says.

He is asking that all parents having children in the Rose school, who desire to learn whether or not the child is susceptible to diphtheria send a note with the child Monday asking that the Schick test be given.

NICARAGUA MUST RETAIN DIAZ FOR YEAR, U. S. EDICT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, May 7.—Peace in the little torn Central American nation of Nicaragua seemed close at hand today with the United States apparently prepared to use stern measures in quelling further rebellious warfare.

Continuation in power of the conservative government of President Diaz, with representatives of the Liberal faction participating in his cabinet and maintenance of this status quo until 1928 when an American supervised election will decide to whom leadership of the country rightfully belongs, has been decided upon by Henry L. Stimson, who, as President Coolidge's personal representative, is endeavoring to end the warfare.

A truce between the Liberals and Conservative armies, terminating today, was to disclose whether or both factions would surrender their arms to the American marines. In conformance with Stimson's request, and while the Washington government believed the Liberals would aid in the pacification of the country, some Liberal leaders held that "marines and American aid would have to fight" to disarm their troops.

The principal barriers to a peaceful adjustment of the civil trouble, as Stimson sees it, have been the insistence of the Liberals that President Diaz should relinquish his post, and the inability under existing circumstances, to guarantee a fair election. Inasmuch as he considers no neutral candidate now available he has reported that best results would obtain from continuance of the Diaz administration until another year hence when, under American supervision, an election can reflect the true wishes of the Nicaraguan people.

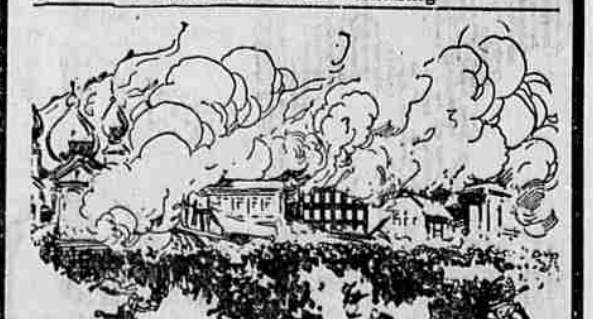
