ANOTHER JUROR MAY TAKE PLACE OF S. W. DUNHAM

Lawyers in DeAutremont
Case Agree on Plan to
Continue Trial at
Jacksonville.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
MEDFORD, Ore., May 10.—In the event of a mistrial being called in the case of Hugh de Autremont, he will be brought to trial immediately, upon one of the three murder indictments against him, according to United States District Attorney George Neuner, of Portland. De Autremont, whose trial was halted yesterday by the illness of juror S. W. Dunham, of this city, is indicted for first degree murder, with his fugitive twin brothers, Ray and Roy, for the deaths of Sidney Bates, engineer of Dunsmuir, Calif., Marvin Seng, fireman, of Dunsmuir, Calif., and E. E. Daugherty, mail clerk, of Ashland, Oregon, all slain during the holdup.

According to District Attorney Neuner, it has been agreed, but not in writing, between counsel for both sides, that, in the event juror Dunham is unable to return to the jury box, within a reasonable time, he will be allowed to return to his home tonight and, be under the care of a physician, and his wife, and that daily reports be made of his condition.

May Take Another Juror

It has also been tacitly agreed, according to Mr. Neuner, between counsel, in the presence of the court, that, if juror Dunham is unable to resume his duties, and as a last resort, a juror could be selected to fill his place, and the evi-

dence taken to date, be read to him, from the transcript of the records, up to the time, the testimony ceased. This at best would be a two days' job for a good reader.

Other legal phases of the latest developments were discussed at length at this morning's conference, similar instances are rare in this state.

Professor E. O. Heinrich, criminologist of the University of California, whose deductions from the overalls and cap found near the scene of the crime, gave the first clues, returned to his home this morning. He was expected to take the stand this afternoon.

Two of the state's witnesses residing in the east, have returned to their homes.

It was reported this noon from the bedside of Dunham, that he was sleeping soundly, without the aid of opiates, and showing some improvement. The fact that natural sleep was operating, was viewed as encouraging news.

Plans for the evacuation of the population of the southern Louisiana parishes in the path of a flood through the Bayou des Glaises have been completed by authorities in preparation for a levee break in that section.

Red Cross chapters in eight Louisiana parishes were ordered to prepare for emergencies. West Baton Rouge, Iberville, Assumption, La Fource, Ascension, St. John the Baptist, St. Charles and Jefferson were the parishes in the danger zone.

Jail Shelters Refugees
ST. JOSEPH, La., May 10.—Barr still remain on the windows, but there are no locks on the doors of the Tensas Parish jail today, for among its occupants are listed some of the leading citizens of the parish. Many persons driven to second stories by the rising flood waters of the Mississippi River have voluntarily taken up their abode in the jail.

The upper floors of the parish court house also have been turned into a lodging-house for men who are sticking to the town in spite of the flood, as well as serving as offices for attorneys and other professional men.

**20 DAYS OUT OF PRISON,
STEALS AN AUTOMOBILE**

DRAMA THAT WON STATE CUP WILL BE PRESENTED FRIDAY

"Trifles" to Be Given By
Championship Players
in Connection With
Lecture on China.

"Trifles," the one-act play which won the state drama tournament is to be presented at the senior high school auditorium Friday night. In connection with the play, a lecture "Barbaric China," will be given by C. W. Clark, of Clark's Studio. "Trifles" was the best presented play at the tournament held at Eugene last week, in which high schools from all over the state participated. The Roseburg team was awarded a beautiful silver cup as a prize for their excellent work, bringing to this city a new honor in the first contest of its kind ever held in Oregon. Without doubt people of Roseburg will be very anxious to see this play as it is presented by the state championship players.

The lecture on "Barbaric China" is especially interesting in view of the present situation in that country. Mr. Clark was for several years engaged in secret service work in China, being in the employ of the United States government. He operated one of the first European photograph studios in that country and had the official permission to make photographs of places and scenes of which pictures were never before made. He has recently made over 80 lantern slides from negatives taken in the very districts where history is now being made in China and his lecture, which was recently given before the Roseburg Kiwanis Club, gives a better conception of conditions in that strife-torn country than any other means could convey.

The proceeds from the presentation of the play and the lecture will be used by the Nolo Forensic club to pay the expenses of the participants in the drama tournament. The Roseburg high school went to a great deal of expense in sending its players to Eugene and keeping them in that city for several days to enter the competition. While the state championship was won, yet the victory was costly and the school is depending largely upon the proceeds from Friday's entertainment to aid in bearing a portion of this cost. The cause is a worthwhile one and the entertainment that will be provided by the students will be well worth the small admission price that is to be charged for this program.

**MRS. RUTH SNYDER
COLLAPSES TWICE
AFTER VERDICT**

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
NEW YORK, May 10.—Mrs. Ruth Snyder, the steely blonde of the Snyder-Gray murder trial, suffered a second collapse in her cell today.

Physicians attended her for nearly an hour after she fainted during what they termed an attack of hysterical epilepsy.

The attack today was the second since Mrs. Snyder heard last night the verdict that meant death in the electric chair. About an hour after the verdict was read she collapsed in her cell, although she showed little emotion at the time the verdict was rendered.

Henry Judd Gray, Mrs. Snyder's cousin salesman, whom she also was found guilty of the murder of her husband, Albert Snyder, magazine art editor, ate his breakfast in composure. He showed no great emotion when the verdict was given.

The doctors, describing Mrs. Snyder's attacks today, said that such epileptic attacks often precede insanity.
