TOO MUCH LUXURY.

A 15-year-old New Jersey boy, son of a wealthy business man, left home the other day and went out to seek his fortune. Departing, he left word that he was running away to get away from the luxury that surrounded him. His parents had been keeping him in an expensive preparatory school; he wanted to go out and get a job.

And so, being, apparently, a youth of spirit, he went. He is now, presumably, working somewhere as he wanted to do; his father, searching for him, says he can keep his job if only he will communicate with home.

There are very few boys who ever run away from home because the parental roof is too luxuriously padded. Likewise, there are very few of us older ones who would ever take flight from the ease of riches. Yet we all sympathize with this New Jersey lad, and we can't help feeling that he must have the right sort of stuff in him.

Luxury such as great wealth makes possible doesn't hurt a grown person. But, after all, it is hardly the best environment for a growing boy. Youth needs a certain amount of hardship, a certain amount of privation, if it is to mature and develop properly. It must not be shielded too carefully. In that respect this Jersey youngster had the right idea.

Nor is this a problem which need concern only the rich. The rest of us folk of moderate—or less than moderate—means can ponder on it for a while with profit.

For we all have a tendency to pamper our children. It's the most natural thing in the world. We want to shield them from the bumps and hard knocks we took at their age; we want to make life as easy and soft for them as we possibly can.

It is a good thing that we so often fail. Youth that is sheltered is handicapped. There is only one way to learn how to meet life's problems, and that is to receive a few of life's jolts.

So all of us can bear in mind, even though we aren't rich. Without thinking we try to give our children too much luxury. It is wiser for us to spend our time teaching them how to meet difficulties, not how to avoid them.

Newspaper advertising in America cost \$235,000,000 last year, a gain of \$15,000,000 over the previous year. It has been argued that advertising is so much waste, so much added unnecessarily to the cost of the articles sold. In one sense, it is true; if the sales could be made without it, the prices could be just that much less to the consumer. But the world buys only on information. It travels because it knows where to go, what it can see, how much it will cost. It builds new houses because it reads how other people build and live and enjoy. It dresses in new fabrics because these come to its reading eyes. It is many times cheaper to get all this information by reading than in any other manner. The world would settle down into a jumble of ignorant, unkempt, leave-me-alone provincial units, but for what it reads in the advertising columns.

By and large, we Americans have endured a lot of "big time" murder trials. But not in the memory of man has there been a trial quite on the level of this Snyder-Gray affair in New York. Not a redeeming feature anywhere! Each party to the crime trying frantically to throw all the blame on the other. Each one seeking to escape at the expense of the one who, a short time ago, was a lover. The thing is about as repelling as a murder trial can get. We could by stretching a point, stomach another Leopold-Loeb case, or even another Hall-Mills trial; but heaven forbid another Snyder-Gray affair.

Apparently we Americans have a pretty fine navy, after all. We had almost been led to imagine otherwise, what with all the stories about battleships being put out of commission, backwardness in cruiser-building programs and so on. But look what happened: we sent a large fleet to China, detached a very sizeable squadron for service off Nicaragua—and still had enough fighting machines left to take the largest fleet that New York ever saw up the Hudson the other day! Must be we have a pretty respectable sort of navy, after all.

For years the men of science have been delving into the mysteries of Nature in an effort to learn her secrets. Some few have discovered—mixtures, compounds and combinations of the elements that produce astounding results. The radio, telegraph, telephone, phonograph, electric light and other inventions that "puzzle the will" and make us wonder where it will finally end. When will mankind attain the ultimate in knowledge of Nature's secrets?

The big idea is this. Merit always reaches the goal just ahead of the other fellow. Merit may not be the first to start, but it always lands the prize. As Punch so aptly expressed it, "true merit, like the pearl inside the oyster, is content to remain quiet until it finds an opening."

Although Haines had won five straight games previously it took the Giant cannoners just three innings to blast him out of the box on their way to a 10 to 1 victory. Hornsby drove out a homer which made his total six for the year so far.

Another game which played havoc with the rankings was the Philly victory over the Cubs. The heavy hitting Chicago clan was out hit 9 to 7 and outscored, 5 to 2.

George Herman Ruth helped his Yankees to a 4 to 2 decision over the St. Louis Browns by slapping his eighth home run of the season with a man on base.

ROSEBURG SCENES TO BE INCLUDED IN FOX FILM VIEWS

Oregon and Washington are to be photographed in a series of "Know Your Own State" pictures for the Fox Film Company. These two states have been chosen as the first ones on account of their beauty in the early summer with fruit and grain in blossom. Elizabeth McKee, manager of the Fox Short Subject department, will arrive in these states May 15th, to visit the different cities and photograph them for the screen. She will personally direct the productions, using the scenic or historic spots in each town as a background for the story.

These "shorts" on the Fox program are called "Fox Varieties," by Miss Pickett, who has already become famous through her successful direction of several "Kings of the Turf" made in Kentucky, "Under Colorado Skies," in the mountains, "My Own Carolina" in that state have brought them to the screen in a beautiful way. "Sky Tribe" and "Cliff Dwellers" are pictures of Indian life, actually made in the villages by Miss Pickett. The successful reception of those already made, gave her the idea for the state series, to be started in Oregon and Washington this month.

Portland, on the Willamette will vie for water honors with Astoria on the Columbia. Both will be used for lumbering and fishing scenes. Salmon spawning and in the streams will be shown. Great trees being felled and in the mills will appear in the film. Benton will be used for fishing pictures, Oregon City, Medford, Roseburg, Gold Beach, Baker, La Grande and Pendleton will furnish fruit blossoms, agricultural scenes, mining interest or some interesting industry. Salem's state buildings will be shown in the film. Its lovely homes and streets will dress up the picture as a change from turbulent waters and wild forests. Crater Lake will be photographed. Much interest among public schools has been created by the series of state pictures.
