MEXICAN GENERAL
LAUGHS AT THREAT
OF YAQUI ATTACK

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

NOGALES, Ariz., May 12.—General headquarters of the Mexican federal army, prosecuting the rebellious movement of Yaqui Indians, today laughed at the report that Yaquis intended to attack Nogales, Sonora. In a statement issued today the military authorities declared that the border town is sufficiently fortified to defeat any attempt of the Indian rebels to invade the community.
