COUNTY TRACK AND FIELD MEET NEXT SATURDAY

Best Athletes From All
Schools to Compete
in Contests at
Finlay Field.

The annual track and field meet of the Douglas county schools will be held at the senior high school athletic field in Roseburg at 1:30 p. m. Saturday, May 14th.

At that time the best athletes among the grade school pupils of the county will compete in contests of skill and endurance for the county championships. Carefully worked out plan of elimination contests has been followed out and the pupils entering this final meet will be the picked athletes of the eight sections into which the county has been divided.

Separate divisions have been made for boys and girls and events suited to each were selected. Competitors are chosen according to weight and the events are open to all school children from the first to the eighth grades.

The annual track and field meet as well as the county declamation contest, originated several years ago by former County School Superintendent Brown, is sponsored and managed by the officers of the county division of the State Teachers Association. The movement has been successful in the past, particularly in the grade schools, in providing added interest in school and in creating a school spirit, a valuable adjunct to teaching.

HEALTH BULLETIN

Questions for Parents to Answer
Parents who have children who are about to enter school for the first time, should ask themselves a number of questions like the following:

Is my child physically fit to enter school?
Has he any defects, and if so, how serious are they?
Is he growing?
Are his height and weight proper for a child of his age?

Does he stand correctly or does he droop?
Is his gait proper or does he limp?
Are his eyes all right and can he hear well?
Is his skin clear?
Does he breathe through his nose?

Has he good, sound teeth?
Is his throat in good condition; are his tonsils swollen or diseased?
Is his back straggly?
Has he flat feet?
Does he eat the foods that will make him grow?

Only a competent examiner can answer these questions and the Douglas County Health Unit, in cooperation with the P. T. A., will conduct examinations in this county free of cost, where the parents may obtain answers to these important questions. Every parent should know whether or not his child is suffering from any physical defect and steps should be taken for the correction of any such defect before the child enters school next fall.

YOUTHFUL JAPANESE IGNORE DRINKING BAN

TOKYO, May 12.—While the younger generation in Japan does not carry hip flasks, it apparently is paying little attention to the liquor laws of the country according to figures published by the police bureau of the Home department.

The legal age at which a Japanese can take a drink is eighteen. During 1926, however, 24,973 youngsters were found guilty of violating this minor "dry" law. The magistrates did not inflict jail sentences on any of those convicted but imposed small fines.
