ZINOVIEFF AGAIN IN TROUBLE WITH SOVIET BRETHREN

MOSCOW, May 13.—G. S. Zinovieff, former president of the communist internationale, is again in trouble with the communist party for attacking its central committee at a non-party meeting.

Considering his action as a breach of discipline, the central committee decided today to lay the matter before the party's central control commission. The Leningrad communist committee and a committee of the Moscow garrison have also demanded an investigation.

The withdrawal of Zinovieff as president of the communist internationale last November after he had occupied the post since its establishment in 1919, was a direct consequence of his differences with and openly announced opposition to Joseph Stalin, in control of the communist party. Zinovieff, before this, had failed of election to the presidency, then was removed as head of the Leningrad Soviet, was ousted from the communist party political bureau, and removed from and censured by a committee of the Moscow garrison. 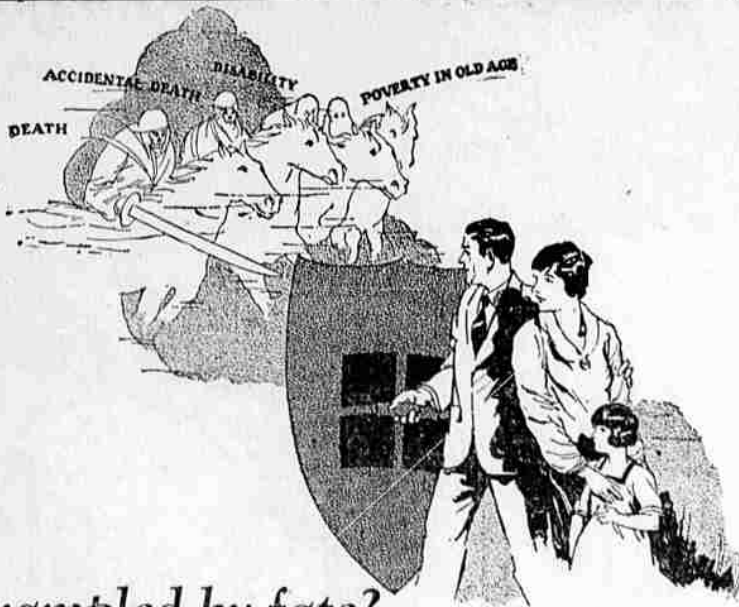
