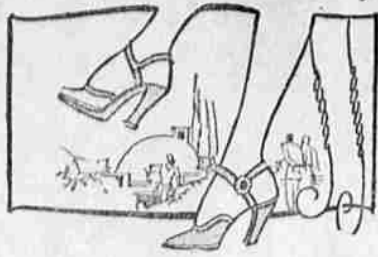

NATIONAL GUARD TO HAVE FIELD DAY SUNDAY, MAY 15

Machine Gunners to Open Demonstration by Firing Ball Ammunition With Tracers.

Residents of Roseburg and surrounding communities will be given an opportunity to witness a realistic war scene Sunday, May 15, when Company D, local guard unit, holds its field day demonstration at the government reservation one mile east of this city. This is the first time a demonstration of this sort has ever been attempted in Roseburg, and will undoubtedly attract a great deal of attention, as these maneuvers are most interesting and entertaining. In these war problems everything has been mapped out in advance and the action moves along with the utmost precision. The company, which is a machine gun outfit, has been divided, part of the men taking the part of infantrymen in the problem.

At a given signal the first section of machine gunners will advance to a designated point and set up their guns and using indirect fire, or the manner in which the target is not visible trains his gun by means of instruments, fires, hitting the target; the gunners will then switch their guns to direct fire and demonstrate the devastating effect of machine gun fire.

In the demonstration only the first two guns in action will fire ball ammunition with tracers, so that the spectators can follow the strike of the bullets. These two guns will be in charge of competent men. The infantry and other machine gunners will fire blank ammunition.

Actual distances in the maneuver will be much less than normal due to the necessity of firing on the government range, and because of limited space. Four machine guns and several squads of infantrymen will be engaged in the war problem which will consume about three-quarters of an hour.

Machine gun fire, which is very interesting, differs from rifle firing in that its object is not to strike targets by individual hits but to lay a pattern on the ground in the shape of an oval, due to the dispersion of shots, to cover the target. These guns are very effective in actual warfare and their devastating work is well known.

The company will leave the armory at 1:30 and march to the scene of activities which will start at 2 o'clock. Ample space has been reserved for the parking of cars, and programs explaining the movements of the men will be distributed.
