SOVIET VAULT IN LONDON DRILLED FOR DOCUMENTS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

LONDON, May 14.—It was generally reported today that the raid on the Soviet House of London, headquarters of the Russian trade delegation, and Arcos, Ltd., Soviet commercial organization, was made to discover whether a certain document of importance to the state, which has been missing for several months, was to be found there.

After working through the night with pneumatic drills and oxyacetylene torches, the police today completed the task of breaking open the safes in Soviet House.

Immediately the safe cutting apparatus was removed, although a large body of police, some of them in uniform, was kept in the offices, and a sufficient force was retained in nearby streets to bar entrance to the building.

The search of the offices of Arcos, Ltd., Soviet commercial agency in London, and the Russian trade delegation, located in the building, was begun Thursday.

The vaults are modern, strong rooms of considerable dimensions, with doors ten feet high, extending virtually over the whole basement of Soviet House.

Soviet House was searched under a warrant said to have been issued under the official secrets act, dealing with the unauthorized possession of state documents.

It gave the police wide powers where possession of such documents is even suspected.

After a protest against the raid was made by the Soviet charge d'affaires to Foreign Secretary Chamberlain, it was admitted by both British and Russian officials in London that a rupture of Anglo-Soviet relations was not at all out of the question. They declared the two countries were nearer a break than at any time since relations were resumed with the signing of the trade agreement in 1921.

Foreign office officials insisted that they could shed no light on whether the police were seeking a source of subversive propaganda or whether their object was to break up a combination of foreign spies.

That there is nothing in Soviet House but trade statistics and a mass of commercial correspondence is the contention of the Soviet officials.

Seven tons of documents, printed matter and correspondence have already been carted away from the Soviet House to Scotland Yard. It was estimated today by Soviet officials, who charged that the police were "still acting in an absolutely arbitrary manner."

Angloes to Labrador.

The Los Angeles would be capable of remaining in the region for four weeks, cruising into the Labrador wilds, where naval hydrographers believe the Frenchmen may be lost and without means of communication with the outside world.

The theory of the hydrographers and reports from points in the six hundred miles between Harbor Grace, Newfoundland and St. Mary's Bay, Nova Scotia, that a plane had been heard spurring the search in the North Atlantic regions.

Island Coast Command

The American and Canadian governments kept scores of patrol craft scouring the ocean from Cape Ann, Mass., to the northern tip of the vast Newfoundland island colony.

In addition to reports that an unidentified plane had passed over Harbor Grace and St. Mary's Bay Monday morning, came rumors from Harbor Main, thirty miles west of Harbor Grace, that an aircraft had passed the point late yesterday while two residents at Harbor Breton, 100 miles southwest of Harbor Grace, said a plane passed the point last Monday morning.

However, little credence was placed on the Harbor Main reports. Fog hampered search in the Newfoundland region yesterday.

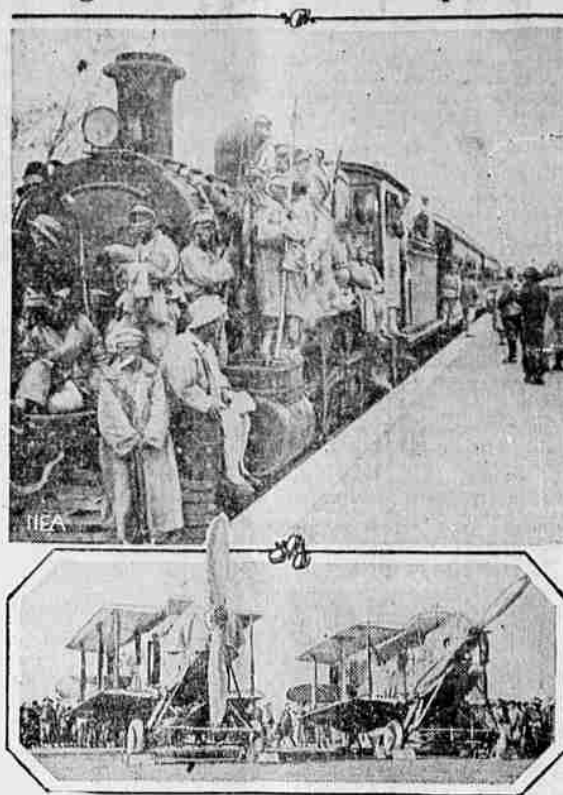
The couple lived together only a few days. It is claimed. Annulment of the marriage and the return of the young woman's maiden name, Lois Maupin, is asked.
