#### SHARKEY INJURES EYE; ODDS SWITCH TO JIM MALONEY

 NEW YORK, May 16.—An injury to Jack Sharkey's left eye made Jimmy Maloney, his fellow Bostonian and contender for the heavyweight crown, a 7 to 5 favorite today for their bout Thursday night at the Yankee stadium. Sharkey was forced to refrain from sparring today because of the wound which Maloney inflicted in one of their previous meetings and which was reopened in a match

with a sparring partner Saturday. Maloney is having 12 rounds of boxing in a final drive to get his weight down to 200 pounds.

Sharkey, weighing 193, expects to dry out to 188 by the time he weighs in Thursday at the office of the state athletic commission. Sharkey, an ex-sailor, has lost none of his confidence that he is the master of Maloney, ex-fight boy. In three previous bouts the ex-sailor came off victorious, he pointed out.

The winner of Thursday's fight is due for a shot at the survivor of a match between Dempsey and Paulino with a chance at Tunney if successful both times. The loser will cease to be a contender and will become just a heavyweight again.

#### "EMPIRE" OF MAD FILIPINO SEEMS TO HAVE FALLEN

(Associated Press Local Wire.)  
 MANILA, May 16.—The "empire" of the insane Flor Euteneiro, self-proclaimed "emperor" of the Philippines, whose domain, tho not recognized by any government, included perhaps as many as 100,000 subjects, seemed today to have fallen, and with its fall what threatened for a time to be a serious revolution apparently had been averted.

Constitutional advisers from Hilo, principal city of the island of Panay, south of here, said 55 of the leaders of Euteneiro's army body-guard which surrounded his "palace" a bamboo shack near Hilo, for the avowed purpose of resisting with their lives any attempt to remove their leader to an asylum, had been arrested, and the menacing situation brought under control.

In addition, 467 of the demented leader's followers have been arrested to the south of the province of Occidental Negros, in connection with an attempt to seize control of four towns last week. Two acts are believed by the constitutional advisers to have crushed the revolutionary move. Although Euteneiro took no part in the Occidental Negros disturbance, the authorities look upon him as having unwittingly been the spirit behind the movement.
