PORTLAND, Ore., May 16.—The local wholesale butter and egg market continues steady with prices unchanged from the close of the last week. Storage of both is very active, a factor serving to keep a market balance for the heavy production now in force.

Fresh country dressed meats and poultry opened quiet this morning after a good clean-up for the week-end. Prices were generally steady.

The potato market shows a moderate demand with trading limited and supplies moderately plentiful. Current wholesale prices range as follows, per cwt:

CHINESE MUTINY ON DOLLAR LINER AND ARE BEATEN

SAN PEDRO, Calif., May 16.—Welding knives and fire axes, two score Chinese stokers and tenders in the engine room of the Dollar liner President Wilson rushed six white officers while the passenger vessel lay alongside her dock here today. The half dozen assistant engineers stood off the battling Chinese and finally quelled the mutiny.

Two of the white engineers suffered minor cuts which the ship's surgeon sewed up. Seven or eight of the Chinese, including three or four ringleaders also required treatment by the surgeon. Several of the Chinese were knocked unconscious.

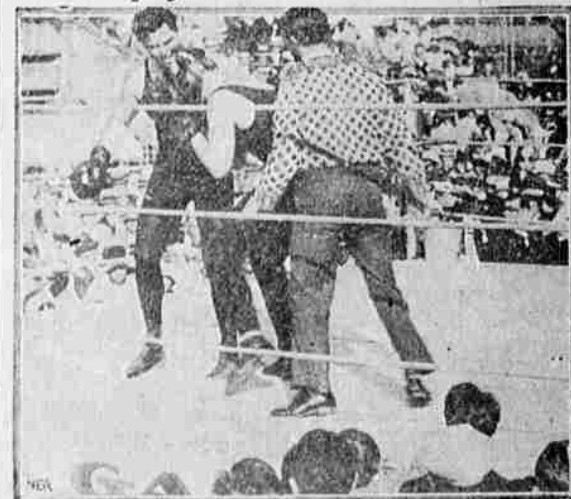
