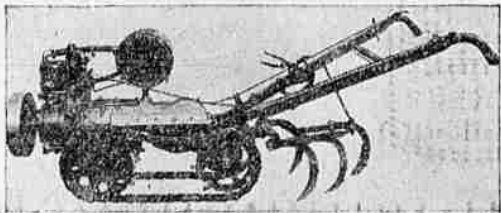

He fell from rings into shallow water in the Bandon swimming tank Friday morning. Saturday night he was operated on and Sunday was brought to Portland by cabin monoplane of the Pacific Air Transport company.

parishes were covered in whole or in part by the flood waters and that approximately 8,000 square miles had been inundated.

"Expert" Advice Pours In.
NEW ORLEANS, La., May 18.—Suggestions for control of floods in the Mississippi river valley have ranged from proposals to catch all the rain water in barrels to more and better levees.

Persons unacquainted with the nature of the immensity of the problem have been responsible for some suggestions. They have poured in by mail, telegraph and otherwise to Secretary of Commerce Hoover, army engineers and to the

Mississippi river commission.

One man proposed that an enormous fleet of steamboats be concentrated at the head of navigation on the Mississippi when the next flood threat appears. With stern paddles turning full speed, the boats would move down the river pushing the crest along and equalizing it. Incidentally, this man says, the speed of the river current would be greatly accelerated and the water soon would be pushed out into the Gulf of Mexico.

Another man advocates that great holes be bored in the river bed to take up the surplus of water and allow it to be absorbed into the ground.

The rain barrel proposal would have inhabitants of the Mississippi valley prevent floods by keeping the water from the river except as they choose to empty the barrels. He did not say where the barrels required for such a scheme would

be procured. Still another suggestion is that the river be filled with huge, electrically driven turbines which would drive the water swiftly to the gulf much in the same manner as the steamboat proposal.
