NEWPORT, R. I., May 19.—The enemy has invaded New England, striking in the dark. The Black Fleet in the great war game bombarded the coast early today and succeeded in landing more than 20,000 troops. The enemy has established a front from Warren's Point, at the tip of the shore line on the east side of Narragansett Bay to Clark's Cove on the outskirts of New Bedford, Mass.

Smoke screens were thrown up to hide the enemy movements from the Black defenders. More than 30 Black aircraft dropped bombs on the coast defenses.

After the battleships Texas and Arkansas and other enemy warships had begun shelling the fort the troops were landed along the beaches of Buzzards Bay. To aid in the movement other vessels shelled towns in the area. Among the villages bombarded were Westport, South Westport, Dartmouth and Westport, N. H.

The bridge and railroad south of Fall River were placed under enemy fire to prevent Blue forces from bringing up reinforcements. Blue officers estimated that by 5:30 a. m., the enemy had landed 23 battalions, with tanks, armored cars and mounted artillery.

NICARAGUAN WAR ENDED, DECLARES COOLIDGE AGENT

PANAMA, May 19.—The war is over in Nicaragua, declared Henry L. Stimson, when he arrived here last night on the way to the United States from Corinto, where he negotiated peace between the warring factions as the personal representative of President Coolidge.

During the past week, he stated, the Liberals and Conservatives had turned over to the Americans 6200 rifles, 272 machine guns and five million rounds of ammunition. He said that no American marine or sailor had fired even a single shot against either of the two factions.

Dr. Juan B. Sacasa, the Liberal president at Puerto Cabezas, Mr. Stimson stated, had a small group of men about him who do not represent Liberal opinion or the feelings of the army.

"General Moncada (Liberal commander in chief), has the army behind him," he added. "He was friendly toward me and agreed that his men would lay down their arms and stop fighting as they have done and are doing."

Mr. Stimson said the two American marines who were killed Monday morning were the victims of hand-to-hand combat which occurred between the Americans and the Liberals. He asserted that the Americans now were organizing a constabulary which would supervise the elections.

GRAIN FARMERS TO CARRY CAMPAIGN TO CONGRESS

DES MOINES, Iowa, May 19.—The grain belt federation of farm organizations claims to represent more than 1,600,000 mid-western farmers who take the fight for farm relief in the 76th congress under the slogan of "protection for all or protection for none." It was decided at the closing session of the body here.

BATTLESHIPS AND TROOPS INDULGE IN MOCK WARFARE

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CITY OF LONGVIEW CONTENTION BONE IN COURT FIGHT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
LONGVIEW, Wash., May 19.—The third and concluding session of quo warranto proceedings instigated by F. J. Bannister, former president of the Long Bell Lumber company against the company on its grounds of alleged violation of its Missouri charter in developing Longview, was set to start here this afternoon before Judge Fred L. Williams, commissioner for the Missouri state supreme court. Previous hearing took place in Kansas City in January and February. The case was adjourned to Longview at the request of Bannister's attorneys.

Jesse Andrews, general counsel for the Long Bell Lumber company, who is conducting the company's defense said today that the nature of the evidence to be presented here depended upon testimony offered by the other side. He said the company was glad to comply with the request for continuation here, as witnesses of value to the company were available here. He said the company however would have been willing to have let the case rest on previous testimony.

The point at issue is whether the Long Bell company exceeded its Missouri charter rights in purchasing land and laying out and establishing the city of Longview. The company contends it acted within its charter rights, the charter having been amended in 1922 and that it exercised good business judgment.

M. B. Nelson, president of the company, testified at previous hearing that the project has proven a success from a business standpoint.

FAKE CHARITY STUFF BUILDS HUGE BUSINESS

ler" offers four for \$1.25, in fact, they do more than offer the ties; without waiting for an order they mail packages of ties to thousands of persons in all the larger cities of the nation and many of the towns and villages. Recipients are urged to forward a remittance, or return the ties. When the ties come back, they are sent out again and again until finally sold.

Ties Mailed Many Times.
Thus a fiber silk necktie may enjoy the distinction of having traveled as far east as Shelburne, Vt., as far west as Portland, Idaho, as far south as New Orleans, and as far north as Milwaukee, before being worn by one of Omaha's well-dressed men.

St. Louis, alone, is barred from the sales map. Both the local tie magnates have a policy of not mailing ties to St. Louis. The reason for this may lie in the opposition of the St. Louis Better Business Bureau to the sales methods.

How the "charity" idea is used to expedite collections is shown in Form Letter No. 3, which "Necktie Ties" mails to persons alleged to be keeping his ties and not paying therefor.

Text of Charity Appeal.
The letter is on a stationery of, and signed in rubber stamp by, S. Sylvan Akatstein, attorney, with offices in the Central National Bank Building, and reads as follows:

I am a lawyer—no doubt that is why my good friend, "Necktie Ties," dropped in to see me yesterday.

There was something on his mind, something unpleasant. I felt sure the minute I laid my eyes on him. I helped him to a chair, got him seated, clasped his hand as usual—but there was something wrong. Old "Necktie" seemed sad. He just hesitated, thought, blinked his lifeless eyes. Finally he told me what the trouble was.

It seemed he has asked you by letter (two letters, in fact) to please send him his money (\$1.25) for the four fibre silk neckties he sent you some three months ago, or to return the ties—and that he has received no reply from you whatsoever. He asked me to advise him. Three months is a long time to hold back a blind man's dollar and a quarter.

Poor soul! There is nothing I could do. One dollar and twenty-five cents is a small amount for an attorney to advise about.

And so, I saw him to the elevator. But the matter was not to be dismissed so easily. It kept recurring to my mind, until now here I sit, writing to you myself.

Naturally, lawyers learn a great deal about human nature. I myself, long since observed that if a good in the man, for a man will. For instance, I know just how it is with you. The answer is an oversight on your part—not petty dishonesty of spirit or lack of consideration for a brother man who is "up and at it" despite that affliction—blindness.

Friend, send him his money or his merchandise. He sent you postage, he says. When you stop to think of it, you'll realize that that is just the plain, everyday right of the thing.

Authorship of Letter Disputed.
Attorney Akatstein is 27 years old, a former newspaper reporter and a graduate of Washington University class of 1921. Today he explained he had not composed the letter, but had merely authorized "Tyler" to use his stationery. He has forbidden further use of his name in that connection. He was under the impression that "Tyler" or Karchmer was the author of the masterpiece, but "Tyler" said Akatstein was the author, and Karchmer said he knew nothing about it. Akatstein is at-

torney for both Karchmer and "Tyler."

Losses in the mails and clerical errors have resulted in dunning letters being sent to some persons who either had not received the ties, or had paid for the ties or returned them. Hence, the complaints to the post office department.

Post Office Inspector Utley states such letters were within the law, if sealed. There is a law against dunning by post card, with resultant humiliation to the recipient. Bills have been introduced in congress to prohibit the mailing of unordered merchandise.

Recipients of unordered merchandise are under no obligation to go to the trouble of returning it, if undesired, Inspector Utley said. No specific law covers the subject, but recipients have the option of returning the merchandise, laying

DOCTORS DISCUSS MENTAL STATE AS ILLNESS BRINGER

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, May 19.—The role that mind plays in disease—the interdependence of psychology and the science of medicine—was considered by the American Medical association in its annual convention today at which several speakers declared that psychic influences frequently are the controlling factors in illnesses, supposed and real.

Dr. Nellis B. Foster, of New York, went so far as to say that definite changes in an individual's personality may result from a belief that an organic disease is present, and Dr. Charles High Nelson of St. Louis declared that an emotional disorder often forecasts goiter, months before definite physical symptoms appear.

Business reverses, domestic trials, grief or repressed emotions were regarded as having no part in emotional or neuroathetic illness by Dr. James S. McLester of Birmingham, Ala., who held, rather, that patients afflicted with that type of sickness derive their mental state by heredity.

Whereas the mental attitude is a contributing factor in some cases of heart disease, diabetes, goitre

and nose and throat illnesses, Dr. McLester believed digestive distress of a neuroathetic patient usually is genuine and in these cases he recommended "a program of re-education."

"If such a person can be persuaded that he is not desperately ill and encouraged to endure his discomforts," he said, "he may actually overcome them. When we know we are riding on defective tires, we avoid rough roads, and when a puncture does occur we take it philosophically."
