SALES OF OREGON WOOL NEAR MARK MILLION POUNDS

(Associated Press United Wire.)
PENDLETON, Ore., May 20.—Wool sales in the present week just released have totaled 265,000 pounds and brought prices of from 27 to 30 cents a pound. The Hill-yard company of Boston secured the K. G. Warner clip of 50,000 pounds at 28 cents. The E. J. Burke company of Portland bought four clips amounting to 135,000 pounds—the Joe Cusha clip, 100,000; A. A. Cole, 15,000; Ed Campbell 20,000; and J. C. Hoskins, 20,000—at prices ranging from 27 to 30 cents.

About 875,000 pounds of wool have been sold to eastern and coast buyers this season and approximately a million pound total should be reached before the end of the buying season. Shearing is now completed and sheep are being headed for summer ranges.

65TH ARTILLERY VETS' REUNION IN PORTLAND JUNE 4
