MISSISSIPPI MOB SLAYS NEGRO WHO ADMITTED MURDER

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
MACON, Miss., May 21.—A confession that he killed C. T. Edwards, young farmer of Cliftonville, Miss., Sunday night, brought the wrath of a mob of 250 to 500 men upon Dan Anderson, 32, negro, yesterday. His body was riddled with bullets in a dismal swamp near the Alabama line, after he had been forcibly taken from Sheriff T. B. Adams of Nobebee county, who had come to Tuscaloosa, Alabama, for the prisoner. Anderson was arrested at Elwood, Alabama. He had fled there after slaying Edwards. The sheriff had been notified there would be no mob violence, if the negro was brought back and given a speedy trial by law. He went for the prisoner. The mob waited until the party had crossed the Mississippi line, then surrounded the sheriff's car and with guns leveled at all occupants took the negro.
