MURRAY'S MOTHER ASKS PATTERSON TO SAVE KELLEY

SALEM, Ore., May 21.—Appealing for executive clemency for Ellsworth Kelley, sentenced to be hanged, Mrs. Margaret Murray, mother of the notorious Tom Murray, has written to Governor Patterson. Kelley and Murray were participants in the state prison break in August, 1924, in which guards John Sweeney and J. M. Holman and the convict, Oregon Jones, were killed. After he had been captured and sentenced to death Murray committed suicide in his cell. Kelley and James Wilton are under sentence of death.

Headed For Cork

NEW YORK, May 21.—The French Cable company this afternoon announced receipt of official notice from the French government stating that Captain Lindbergh was over Ireland heading in the direction of Cork, at 5:20 o'clock this afternoon, Irish time.

VALENCIA, Ireland, May 21.—The government wireless station here is advised by the steamer Collier Nogi that she sighted a gray airplane heading east-southeast while the Nogi's position was approximately 52.45 north latitude, 12.5 longitude. The plane was flying rather low.

SMERWICK HARBOR, COUNTY KERRY, Ireland, May 21.—Captain Lindbergh's trans-Atlantic plane passed over this point at an altitude of about one thousand feet heading for Cork. The machine seemed to be functioning excellently. Climate conditions were favorable.

SHARKEY WHIPS MALONEY; BOUT ENDS IN FIFTH (Continued from page 1.)

prise. The blow that did more than any other to finish the burly Maloney was a newly-developed weapon, a devastating right, which carried even more dynamite than the hooking left on which the tar pinned his hopes in fights before. With that addition to his armament, Sharkey became one of the most formidable and resourceful of heavy-weight contenders as well as a definite menace to the title holder, Gene Tunney, who looked on with rapt attention. Sharkey beat the slugging Maloney at his own game of solid punching even as he beat the huge negro, Harry Wills' own game of infighting last fall. Grudge Combat As the men entered the ring they glared the ill-willing which has existed for months, and Maloney turned his broad back in contempt. With more speed than has been seen here at least since the Jack Dempsey-Firpo title fray, the two swapped whirling punches, fast but each carrying the weight of huge muscles and bulging pounds of heft. Sharkey was the weaver, dodging cat, Maloney the rushing bull. For three rounds they fought viciously and the crowd could see they were smothering threats at each other as the tide of battle carried them together for a moment. Finale is Sudden The end came with melodramatic suddenness and many in the great arena never saw the punch that sent Maloney down for the first time in the fourth round. There were two dancing, falling figures, then a blur from Sharkey's shoulder and the form in the green trunks dropped like a log. Instead of waiting for the bell
