

DANCING EACH AFTERNOON OF BERRY CARNIVAL

The Strawberry Carnival dances are to be one of the 125 features of the fair. The dances will be held on Friday and Saturday afternoon, starting at one o'clock and continuing to six p. m. at the Oregon Garden. In the evenings the orchestra will be transferred to the armory for the dances to be held there. A six-piece orchestra will play all afternoon of each day of the carnival and some extraordinary features are planned. These dances will do much to provide entertainment for the visitors to the carnival.

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PLANE SHORTAGE WILL NOT AFFECT FOREST PATROL

The little band of former service aviators who annually patrol the great forest areas of the west to detect and aid in the fighting of fires will be on the job again this summer despite a shortage of planes.

The War Department, which for the last eight years has been furnishing the Forest Service with machines for this purpose, has found a way to get around a shortage and add a distressed neighboring branch of the government.

As a result planes will be operated again this summer from Glendale and Sacramento, Calif.; Eugene, Ore.; and Vancouver and Spokane, Wash. In an effort to cut down the \$20,000,000 annual fire loss in the national and private forests.

Transporting fire-fighting tools and supplies and dropping them where needed on the firing lines, scouting of fires after severe electrical storms and during periods when smoke and haze obscure the visibility from ground lookout stations and reconnaissance to determine where best to concentrate fire fighting forces are the chief duties of the forest air patrol.

Eight planes were used last year to protect the main forest regions of California, Oregon, Washington, northern Idaho and western Montana. From June to September, the season of greatest fire hazard, a total of 483 flights were made for a flying time of 1,092 hours. The cost of the work, carried on without a major crash or accident to personnel amounted to \$43,539.

Myrtle Creek has a fast team and in the two games played with Roseburg they had some bad breaks. The two teams are quite evenly matched and should give the fans a good entertainment.

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OUSTED PILOT OF BELLANCA PLANE PLANS AN APPEAL

NEW YORK, May 21—An appeal from the supreme court decision vacating the injunction granted him against the Columbia Aircraft Corporation was contemplated by Lloyd Bertrand in his fight to remain a member of the crew of the Bellanca monoplane, Columbia.

Supreme court Justice May in Brooklyn lifted the injunction that had held the Columbia from starting on its projected flight to Paris.

Plans for an appeal were disclosed by Bertrand shortly after sudden preparations for a start of the Bellanca for Paris this morning were cancelled because of high wind conditions in the North Atlantic.

Clarence D. Chamberlin, pilot of the craft, said a start would be made early tomorrow if weather conditions permit.
