CHINA BELIEVED PLACE RECORDED EARTHQUAKE

LONDON, May 22.—The New observatory seismograph recorded an earthquake beginning at 11:50 o'clock last night and continuing for four hours. Its epicenter was estimated to be about 4700 miles distant, possibly in eastern China.

SIDNEY, N. S. W., May 22.—A big seismological disturbance was recorded by the interview observer at Sydney on May 22 at 8:45 o'clock this morning, with its center probably in Burma or Assam.

OREGON TRUNK TO ESTABLISH FIVE BUILDING CAMPS

BEND, Ore., May 23.—Five large construction camps are to be established between Bend and Paulina in connection with building the region "Trunk" extension, which is to reach Klamath Falls. It is reported here. The week opened with continuation of activity unbroken last week when an announcement was made of the Oregon Trunk's intention to start work.

Visible evidence here is presence of several cars of railroad equipment, arrival of parties of laborers, work of surveyors who have staked off the new line from the Oregon Trunk terminus here. Except for some blasting where the road crosses lava flows, the new line will present little difficulty.
