Union, Cove and Pendleton, while not favoring the proposed extension, are seeking more facts before reaching a definite stand on the matter and Baker is divided, due to the eastern half of the county being on the proposed route. WINCHESTER BAY ROAD CURVE PLAN IS TURNED DOWN

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., May 24.—After half an hour's discussion with the Douglas county court, the state highway commission voted down the county's proposal to change the survey of the Roosevelt highway through the town of Winchester Bay.

The court's proposal would put in a 28 per cent curve as well as lengthen the line somewhat.
Commissioner H. D. Van Duzer objected to putting in a curve on a state highway when the commission is spending a great deal of money eliminating curves.

"Every curve is a death trap," said Van Duzer, "and we do not propose to make any more of them than can possibly be helped." His viewpoint was upheld by Commissioners Duke and Gates.

C. H. Tichenor, representing the Port Orford Chamber of Commerce, urged the commission to buy the land between the Roosevelt highway and Battle Rock near Port Orford. He said some lots would be donated while the others would be sold to the state for \$3,000. It was brought out that the lots that would be donated are under water part of the time. He was told the price would have to be made lower before the state would buy.

TWO JACKSON COUNTY BURGLARS SENTENCED

MEDFORD, Ore., May 24.—Ray Carrar, of Ashland, who ten days ago escaped with E. H. Sprinkle, alias William Allen, still a fugitive from the county jail, and indicted with George Downman for the burglary of the Swift company packing plant at Ashland, yesterday entered a plea of guilty and was sentenced to two years in state prison by Circuit Judge C. M. Thomas. Downman entered a similar plea and received the same sentence.

Harry Scott, a rancher of the Derby district, indicted on a charge of setting up and operating a still, entered a plea of guilty, and was sentenced to a year in the county jail.
Joe Carlin, indicted on a grave statutory charge, entered a plea of not guilty.

AIRPLANE CRASHES, KILLING TWO MEN

SANTA MONICA, Cal., May 24.—Lieutenant Walter J. Ligon, officers reserve, and a student pilot, Ivan L. Hall, were killed today when their airplane crashed at Clover Field. Eye witnesses said the wings of the plane collapsed when it was about a thousand feet up.
Both aviators lived in Los Angeles. Lieutenant Ligon was 28 years of age, and Hall was two years his senior. The machine, a biplane, was said to be privately owned by a Los Angeles physician.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 24.—Butter and egg prices are generally steady today but trading on the dairy exchange has effected a one-half cent drop in standard cube butter to 38 1/2 cents and a cent lower price for medium grade eggs to 18 cents. The change in butter makes the butterfat buying price one-half cent lower at 39 1/2 cents.
Receipts of asparagus on the local wholesale market continue light and the price has been advanced from \$1.50 to \$1.60 per dozen bunches. Some shipments are being attracted from Walla Walla as a result.

Scattering arrivals of Oregon strawberries were in light demand at \$5 and \$6 per crate. More liberal receipts are expected throughout the day.
