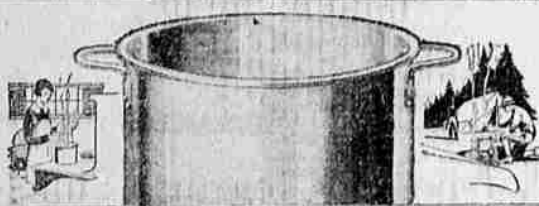

LINDBERGH HAS CEMENTED BOND OF FRIENDSHIP

Heroic Oceanic Flight Has Placed United States in Good Favor.

WORLD AMBASSADOR

Parisians Offer Free Food, Clothes, Houses; 5 Sacks of Mail, Telegrams to Be Opened.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

PARIS, May 25.—Charles A. Lindbergh has become America's ambassador to Europe. Wherever he goes in the old world, the young hero from the new world probably will be the guest at his country's embassies and legations.

As long as he stays in France, the American embassy in Paris will be his headquarters and when he flies to Brussels on Saturday, he will be a guest at the embassy there.

In the minds of all Americans living in Europe, this is as it should be, for never has a citizen of the western republic received such spontaneous homage from the old world, its kings, its presidents and its peoples.

"That boy has put America on good relations with every nation," a European diplomat remarked.

Egotism Utterly Lacking

What were Lindbergh's first words on landing at Le Bourget is a question being animatedly discussed in Paris.

According to some, he said, "Here I am, I have done it," while others insist he said, "Is this Paris?" But an eye witness declares he simply remarked, "I am Charles Lindbergh," and this is confirmed by the floor himself.

Stephane Lauzanne, managing editor of the Matin, wanted to clear up the matter, so he asked the aviator personally, "Is it true that you said, 'I am Charles Lindbergh'?"

"Yes, that's what I said," was the answer.

"But why?" the editor asked.

"I was afraid they might think I was somebody else," Lindbergh replied.

"All the time," M. Lauzanne observed, "there were not so many people expected at Le Bourget from across the Atlantic, but Lindbergh is an unaffected hero."

Offers Galore

Among the thousands of letters and telegrams which have been sent to him, the ones which afforded Captain Lindbergh the most amusement are communications from two restaurants in Paris announcing that he can eat free of the best they have for the rest of his life, and another from a tailor ready to clothe him sumptuously at the same price until the end of his days. He has even received offers of houses fully furnished from a number of cities in the United States.

Apparently all the "Lindberghs" of the globe are existing or claiming relationship. Two hundred messages signed "Lindbergh" have already been received, rejoicing over the name brought to the family name.

Five sacks of mail and three thousand telegrams have been received at the embassy to date. One perfumed envelope contained a gold medalion, while there are many other perfumed envelopes containing impassioned expressions of devotion.

EX-ROSEBURG LADY DIES AT NEWPORT

The Newport (Oregon) Journal of the date of May 11, containing an account of the death of Mrs. M. M. Armistead, who for many years was a resident of Roseburg, and Mrs. Armistead, the lady being well known here. The item in the Newport paper was as follows:

Mrs. Armistead was born September 17th, 1851, being the first white child born in the Sheboygan district, Wisconsin. Her father was one of the first homesteaders in that part of the state. Later the family moved to Potsdam, N. Y., where she lived to womanhood and was educated. Then came west to Nebraska for a short time and then moved to Portland, Oregon, where she made the acquaintance and became the wife of D. M. Armistead on May 12, 1907.

In April 1912 they moved to Newport, Oregon, where they lived continuously ever since. It was at her home here where she departed this life at noon, May 11th, 1927.

Here the deceased became an active member of the Presbyterian church, Relief Corps, and became a member of the order of the Eastern Star, under the auspices of which the funeral was conducted.

To make her acquaintance was to love her. She lived her life for the joy and comfort of others and never tired in her church and social work even through the illness and suffering of the last three

years of her life.

Those who survive her besides the bereaved husband are: two daughters, Mrs. Elaine Vose of San Francisco, and Mrs. Winnifred Bellwell of Sierra Madre, California, one son S. H. Hinchings and one granddaughter, Hazel Bee James of Newport, two stepsons, Wm. J. and Victor M. Armistead and two stepdaughters, Mrs. Amy Stevenson and Ella Armistead. One brother Arthur W. Housinger of Gold Hill, and a sister, Mrs. Alice Dains of Potsdam, N. Y., besides Hazel Bee James there are fourteen grand children and two great grand children.

Funeral services were held at the Presbyterian church Tuesday morning after which the remains were removed to the Mount Scott cemetery in Portland for burial beside her daughter, Mrs. Grace Grogan, the mother of Hazel Bee James.

He was last seen at midnight when he and a youth, John Anderson, returned from a trip up Ten Mile lake to visit Joe Schire. Anderson went to bed but Thom remained in the boat for some reason.

Thom was well known in this section and formerly operated a brewery in North Bend.

Mr. Thom, whose death is reported in the above Marshfield dispatch, was a resident of Roseburg for many years while engaged as a timber cruiser. He will be remembered by many residents of this city.
