MARKETS

PORTLAND, Ore., May 25.—The local supply of Oregon strawberries is growing stronger each day. Field dollars, well colored and well packed, sell readily at \$5 per crate wholesale.

Asparagus prices have settled at a firm \$1.50 per dozen bunches.

A general advance has been declared by local millers on all grades of family flour. The advance is 20 cents all around with the best grade priced at \$8.80 per barrel. The strong wheat market brought about the increase.

The price of standard grade cube butter, remains unchanged today, but the other three grades are all one-half cent lower on the dairy exchange. Eggs are unchanged.

Country dressed meats and poultry are steady on the local wholesale market.

Demand for wool is active though business has been light this week. Sales are scheduled at Condon (Thursday) and at Prineville June 21.

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On his way to his cell in the company of a jailer and his sister, Kelly puffed nervously on a cigarette. Asked what he thought of the verdict, he said:

"I guess the jury said what they thought was right."

He declined to make any other comment.

Judge Burnell had told the jurors that if they could not reach an agreement before court convened this morning they would be given all the time they wanted.

Kelly will remain in the county jail until he comes up for sentencing next Tuesday.

Miss Mackaye, whom the state charged and its witnesses testified, spent many nights with Kelly alone in his Hollywood apartment, was not in court when the verdict was announced.
