FEAR OF HEARST BROUGHT \$700,000 BID FOR TELEGRAM

PORTLAND, Ore., May 26.—The Oregon Journal offered \$700,000 cash for The Portland Telegram in October last year, because the Journal feared that William Randolph Hearst, famous New York publisher, was in the field trying to purchase The Telegram. According to testimony given today by Colonel R. W. Hagood, attorney for the Journal, in the hearing of the suit brought by Amedeo M. Smith trustee in bankruptcy for The Telegram Publishing company, to enjoin the Journal from publishing the comic strips "Mutt and Jeff," "The Nobby" and the "Fontaine Box" features.

About October 1926, testified Hagood, "the managers of the Oregon Journal were in frequent consultation. Representatives of Hearst were in Portland and they were negotiating for the purchase of The Telegram. The Journal's executives finally agreed to make an offer of \$700,000 for The Telegram. "We figured that the Telegram was worth about \$200,000 to \$250,000, but we were willing to pay the difference, \$450,000, to keep Hearst out of the field."

MacDonald Potts, business manager of the Telegram, testified that the plant of The Telegram was worth \$35,000 to the newspaper as a going concern, that its circulation was worth \$500,000 and that the Associated Press membership was worth from \$500,000 to \$750,000.

MOVIE MAN COMING.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, May 26.—Schwartz and company, Uvalde wool merchants, rejected all bids on 300,000 pounds of wool offered for sale. Peterson and company, Spofford wool merchants, and F. A. Piper of Uvalde, sold 350,000 pounds at prices reported to range closely around 30 cents per pound. Peterson's entire offering of 200,000 pounds was eight months clip; Piper sold 90,000 pounds of eight months clip and 60,000 pounds of twelve months clip. Buyers said the spring clip for the most part was shorter staple than usual.

The eight months clip was reported sold very close to 30 cents per pound and the other offering only slightly higher.

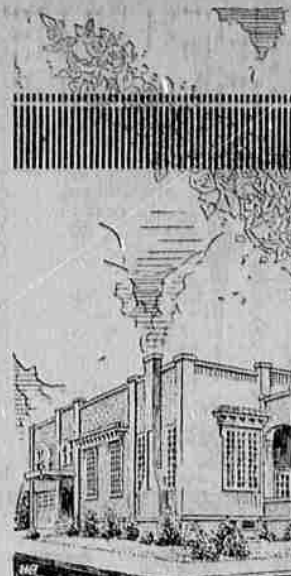

Hudson Super-Six Coach Lowers 1000 Mile Record

The following telegram was received by the Roy Catching Motor Co. this morning.

Endurance test started Saturday morning at 6:01 a. m. with idea of lowering thousand mile stock car record. Run was completed at 7:06 p. m., being officially timed by Western Union, and laps checked by Los Angeles Evening Express. Average speed was seventy six and four-tenths miles per hour, and last ten laps were turned at an average of eighty four and five-tenths miles per hour. In order to maintain laps at eighty four miles per hour it was necessary to turn better than eighty nine miles per hour on the straightaway. Perfect condition of car, after run was finished, is evidenced by fact that Barney Oldfield, who drove the car continuously throughout entire run, is leaving in the car for Portland, Oregon, where he is to officiate at an automobile race, and from there will drive across the continent to New York.
