FARM POINTERS
Planting all potatoes is not recommended to Oregon farmers by the state experiment station. There is a tendency to enlarge the acreage of potatoes and this will be done in a number of cases by planting cuttings. The enlarged acreage presents the possibility of producing more potatoes than the country can use. If there are more potatoes than are grown this year the country will probably be unable to use them. That will mean a surplus with low prices for good stock, and no prices for poor stock. Planting cuttings faces the hazard of poor prices for the small percentage of good ones that can be expected, and no price for the large percentage of culls.

Harrowing potatoes and corn before and after the corn is up kills the weeds easily and effectively.

LINDBERGH FLIES OVER PARIS; NAME BENEFIT MAGNET

PARIS, May 27.—Captain Lindbergh saw Paris from above this morning and again was received in state by most of the French government when he came back to earth.

It was a morning of play for France's hero, for he was able to spend an hour in the air and several other hours "talking shop" with leaders of French aviation at Le Bourget and Villacoublay flying fields. His flight was made in a French plane, in which he saluted France's unknown soldier by making graceful dips over the tomb in the Arc de Triomphe.

Lindbergh's terrestrial ceremonies resumed later with a luncheon tendered by M. Painleve at the ministry of war, attended by Marshal Foch, General Pershing, and four members of the cabinet.

Afterward the flier attended a vast reception at the residential palace of Paul Doumer, president of the French senate. There all Parisian notables gathered to see and to try to shake the hand of the noted New York Paris traveler.

No sign of diminution of Captain Lindbergh's popularity was apparent today. The crowd which gathered outside the impressive home of the president of the senate during today's reception rivalled the great concourse which yesterday cheered and cheered the hero at the municipal reception at the Hotel de Ville.

Tonight here will be a gala benefit organized by the Aero club for the relief of the families of those who have died for aviation. Lindbergh will be there and there are no tickets to be bought at any price. Those interested in the philanthropic enterprise had only to produce a rush for tickets which ordinarily people have to be urged to buy.

MARSHFIELD MAN USES GUN ON SELF; WOMAN WOUNDED

SALEM, Ore., May 27.—Under a new law effective tomorrow, Secretary of State Koser today reappointed T. A. Raffety chief state traffic inspector and appointed as assistant in the state traffic squad G. Max Flannery of Salem, and Kenneth F. Bloom of Albany, and as lieutenants Jay Saltzman of The Dalles, J. J. McMahon of Jacksonville and O. O. Nichols of Medford.

BOSTON, May 27.—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "There is a broader demand for wool and the tendency of prices is upward both here and in the west. The call has been principally for the finer qualities. This reflects better demand for goods."

"Heavy buying has been the rule in Texas, Nevada, Utah and Oregon, with some activity in Wyoming at prices substantially back to the February contract levels, while \$3 to 35 cents in the general price level thru the bright wool states."

"Foreign markets are firm, with fine wools slightly higher. 'Mohair is steady.' The Commercial Bulletin will publish the following wool quotations tomorrow: Scoured basis: Oregon: northern 19¢; 19¢; fine and fine medium clothing 90¢; valley No. 1 90¢; 95¢.
