WEATHER GIVES CHICAGO CHANCE TO CATCH YANKS

Dripping skies over the eastern sector for baseball wars have set the New York Yankees and Giants to wondering just what the weather man has against them.

In the past two days the rampaging Chicago White Sox, taking advantage of the Yankees' inactivity to win three ball games, have crept within a game and a half of the American league champions. And the Giants today found themselves in third place, a half game behind another Chicago crew that is pounding hard on the trial of the league leading Pittsburgh Pirates.

The White Sox "improving each shining hour," kept after Detroit for 12 innings before bunting two singles with Gehring's error to push over the run needed for a 4-3 victory.

Although Pittsburgh kept on its winning surge with a 2 to 1 victory over the world champion St. Louis Cardinals, the Cubs clung to the Pirate trail with a rousing 11 to 2 conquest of the Cincinnati Reds.

Two twin bills in the American league found the teams just where they started when the shooting was all over. Cleveland split a bargain affair with the St. Louis Browns, winning the second tilt, 9 to 7, after O'Rourke had won the first for St. Louis 2 to 1 with a home run in the tenth.

Lefty Grove was pitching the Athletics to a shut out victory over Boston in the first game of a double header when something slipped in the ninth and the Sox scored once. Philadelphia won that one, 3 to 1, but lost the nightcap 4 to 3.

FREE ATTRACTIONS AT ROSE FESTIVAL

PORTLAND, Ore., May 27.—All events for the 1927 Rose Festival, to hold the amusement boards of Portland from June 13 to 18, will be free with the exception of the pageant, "Rosaria." The proceeds from the five night performances of the great spectacle will serve to finance the entire week of attractions and provide a sinking fund to assure the festival and pageant to be produced next year and succeeding years on a grander scale each year.

"Plans have been made to fix the admission prices to 'Rosaria' so that all persons may attend and, by the number of these admissions, the entire expense of the festival be paid," said Frank C. Riggs, president of the Portland Rose Festival, Inc.

The two great parades, the floral on Thursday and the merryk-hana on Friday will be free on the streets. For those wishing to view the parades at Multnomah stadium an admission charge will be made. For reserved seats the price will be 75 cents. Twenty thousand seats for parades will be available at 25 cents each.

Everything else during the week will be free to the public including the impressive police review at the stadium at 10 o'clock Monday morning, June 13, followed by a parade in the business section. The crowning of the Queen of the Rose Festival at Laurelhurst park, formal opening of the festival center, fireboat exhibition, military parade and air circus and other opening day features are all free.

On Tuesday the opening of the annual Rose show in the Auditorium, Chinese baby show, Oriental Chinatown carnival and many other downtown features will serve a thrill and entertain crowds Tuesday and Wednesday will be the pageant at Laurelhurst park, when a thousand Portland girls will present "The Fairy Rose."

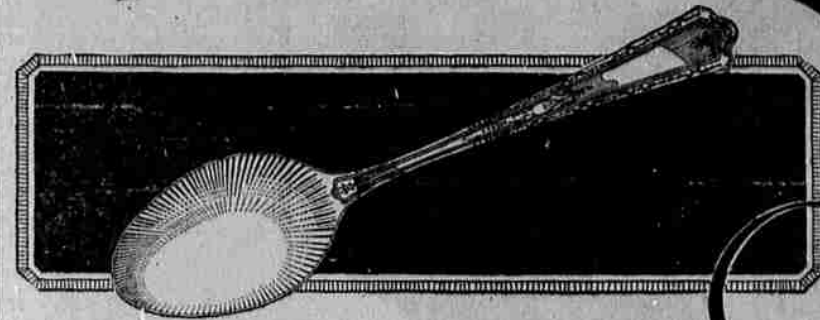

1 tsp. salt
Few grains pepper
1/4 cup flour
