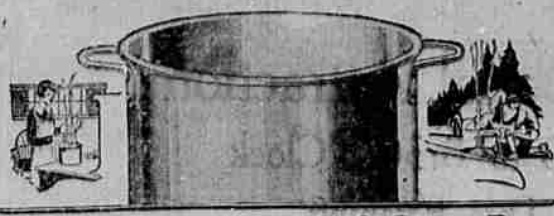

He enlisted in the army for the Civil war and served as a sergeant with Co. C, 4th Wisconsin Infantry. He has been a resident of the home since 1914. Mr. Fahringer leaves three sisters, Mrs. Bossey, residing in Troy, New York, and Malinda Pitzer in Deerfield, Wisconsin, and Ella Fahringer of Wisconsin. PLEASING AUTO FLOAT PARADE SEEN FRIDAY

Exhibition Yesterday Was One of Finest of the Carnival.

MANY ENTRIES MADE

Unique Ideas Presented in Many of the Floats Entered by Various Organizations.

The decoration auto and float parade which was presented yesterday afternoon as a part of the Strawberry Carnival program, was one of the best of its kind the city has known. The parade was a long one and was outstanding because of the excellency of the numerous entries. Each float was a gorgeous thing, keeping the spectators thrilled by the succession of beauty.

First came the colors, Douglas County Concert Band, queen's float, and chiefs.

The first float was an entry by the Eagles lodge, costumed members forming a symbolic group.

The Mooseheart Legion entered a drill team which executed various march steps.

The Salvation Army float was typical of the work done by the organization.

The Umpqua Squaw had an attractive float upon which their totem and banner were mounted with several of the members riding.

A beautiful and symbolic float was entered by the I. O. O. F. lodge, with various uniforms groups marching to represent the various branches of the order.

The Kiwanis club's float exemplified one of the purposes of the organization, that of bringing about a closer relationship between the city man and the farmer.

The Roseburg Camp Fire Girls had costumed groups showing the various activities in which the girls are engaged.

One of the fine floats was that of the Myrtle Creek Camp Fire Girls, upon whose evergreen covered float rode Mrs. Frances Drake, a pioneer lady who has been a resident of the county for 52 years. Mrs. Drake is now 84.
