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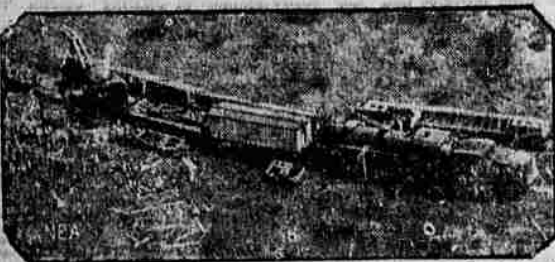

ENFORCEMENT DRY LAW DUTY OF CHRISTIANS

Annual Report of Presbyterian Board Declares Task.

SUPPORT IS URGED

Christian Citizens Must Aid in Law Enforcement in Order to Gain Success.

(Associated Press Telex Wire.)
SAN FRANCISCO, May 31.—Prohibition enforcement as a duty of all Christian Americans is emphasized in the annual report of the Presbyterian Board of Christian Education presented to the Presbyterian general assembly here Monday morning.

"During the last year," says the board in its report, "vast strides have been made in the enforcement of the eighteenth amendment. In spite of renewed activities of the enemies of prohibition, it is more firmly entrenched today than ever before. There can be no doubt that the economic, social, moral, and religious benefits that have resulted from prohibition are so gigantic that they will never be overcome by wet propaganda."

"If prohibition has been charged with failure it is due largely to the fact that prohibition as written has never been tried. The courts are showing constantly a more vigorous enforcement of the law. District attorneys are on every hand recognizing their responsibility. The liquor traffic has gone and as a commercialized vice has disappeared permanently. It exists here and there, it is true to the last of those charged with the responsibility of law enforcement. The liquor traffic is more insidious today than ever. It is more hopelessly outlawed. With the rising tide of intelligent youth there is no doubt that the safety of prohibition is assured."

No Politics Wanted.
The board recommends "enforcing the eighteenth amendment through competent and trustworthy servants of the law."

Supporting district attorneys with the enforcement of the act by Christian citizens.
"Making punishment swift, sure and certain."
"Divorcing the enforcement of the prohibition act from politics."

Unless these ideals, says the report, "are supported by the Christian citizens of the community, the enforcement will always be lax. The task of tomorrow is to make law and law enforcement in America a fact."

Sunday Law Crusade.
Loss of the American Christian Sabbath is seriously threatened, declares the annual report of the Presbyterian Board of Christian Education presented to the general assembly Monday morning.

Church people, rebuked for their indifference, are being awakened to the peril and combat the movement to commercialize Sunday into "amusement day."

The board reports that its representatives have appeared during the past year before legislative committees where the Sabbath question was pending. Special attention was given to the bill before congress to secure a Sabbath law for the District of Columbia.

Communications were sent to Presbyterian pastors and co-workers in states where legislation regarding the Sabbath Day was pending, urging upon them the importance of making their voices heard in the legislative process.

"As a result," says the board, "much legislation that would have been passed in favor of common sense and the Sabbath day has been completely killed."

Enemies at Work.
"Although the work of the past year has greatly exceeded that of the preceding year," the board admits, "it has come far short of measuring up to the demands of the situation. Powerful and well-organized forces are in the field today to destroy the Sabbath. The commercialized amusement interests are ceaselessly active in their efforts to break down our Sabbath laws and the sentiment against Sunday amusements that they may make the Lord's day 'amusement day' in America."

"Many of our church people are becoming more careless in their attitude toward the day, and many church leaders seem to be unaware of the peril we are facing from increasing Sabbath desecration."

\$1,500,000 Bridge Will Open This Month.

Niagara River Regions at War in 1812 to Be Connected by International Span.

BUFFALO, N. Y., May 31.—More than a century of peace and good will between the United States and Canada will be commemorated in the opening to traffic this month of the \$1,500,000 "Peace Bridge" across the Niagara River between this city and Fort Erie, Ont.

The bridge connects not only the two great American commonwealths, but rests on land in each which was the scene of hot fighting during the War of 1812. The American end of the bridge is within the grounds of Fort Porter, now abandoned. The Canadian end is only a short distance from the ruins of Fort Erie, a military post of a century ago.

The five piers on which the 4,150 foot structure rests are built where Lake Erie narrows into the Niagara River. Although the bridge is the sixth to be built across the river between Lake Erie and Lake Ontario, it differs from the others in being virtually owned by the public. Tolls will be collected until the cost of building has been met, when the bridge becomes the property of the two governments.

The international character of the bridge will be emphasized at the formal opening, probably early in September, in the presence of President Coolidge for the United States and the Prince of Wales and Premier King for Great Britain and Canada.

MOSCOW, May 31.—Christianity is spreading in Soviet Russia despite the intense activity of the State Anti-Religion Organization, an unofficial communist body which branches throughout the Soviet Union.

The growth is most pronounced, according to government figures, in the Baptist and Evangelical denominations.

M. Poutintzev, a member of the Anti-Religion body, attributes the growth of Christianity to the fact that young men enroll as Christians to escape military service.

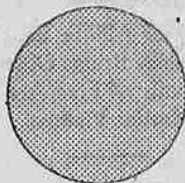
Under the old regime the religious aversion to war manifested by members of these churches was respected and the same immunity has been continued under the present regime.

DIAMOND LAKE HATCHERY SETS NEW EGG RECORD

PORTLAND, Ore., May 28.—With the capture of 560 female trout in one trap at the Diamond Lake hatchery in one night, it is estimated that 1,680,000 eggs were taken and a record set for any egg-taking station in Oregon, and possibly in the nation, according to information received yesterday by M. L. Ryckman, superintendent of hatcheries of the Oregon game commission.

"This certainly booms our stock in Diamond Lake," Mr. Ryckman commented after reading the news. For several weeks he had been awaiting word of the opening of the egg-lake at Diamond Lake and because it was so late this year he had begun to give up hope of obtaining many trout eggs at that lake.

Only one trap of the three on the

lake is being used at present because the water is too cold at the other traps for fish to begin spawning yet.

Snow is still deep on the mountain roads leading to the lake, but Lloyd Tackey, in charge of the work there, hopes to get a truck into the lake by June 15. At present he can drive only to within 14 miles of the lake. Snow probably will lie in banks in the heavy timber around the lake all summer this year, making the water finer for fishing than ever before, Ryckman says. Due to the more promising conditions the force of men there has been increased from five to eight. The only way to get to the lake is to snowshoe in, according to Mr. Ryckman.
